Republican County Convention.

The republican electors of Webster county, are requested to send delegates from the several townships to meet in convention at the court house in Red Cloud, Friday, September 20th, 1889, at 10 o'clock a.m. for the purpose of placing in nomination one candidate for

Also 10 delegates to the republican state convention to be held at Hastings, Nebraska, October 23, 1889, and 10 delegates to the congressional convention and to transact such other business as may properly come before the convention.

The several townships are entitled to representation as follows, based on the vote cast for Hon. George H. Hastings, presidential elector in 1888, giving one delegate at large to each township and one for every 15 votes or major fraction thereof

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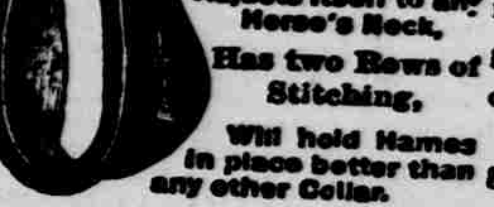
