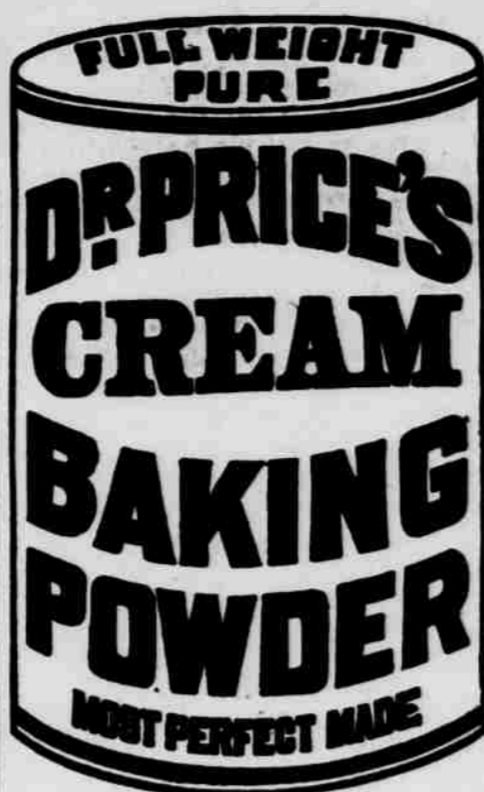

SOLDIERS' REUNION.



A Grand Success.

Camp Davis Literally Swarming with Soldiers.

A GENERAL GOOD TIME.

The old soldiers reunion which was only conceived a few days ago by our G. A. R. boys for this week, came off per program, commencing on the 17th. A large number of old soldiers from all parts of this state and Kansas were present.

On the opening of the camp, Colonel Gage of Franklin was selected as Commander of the camp, and the following soldiers were appointed as his aides: F. A. Harmon, of Bloomington, E. H. Jones, O. R. Downs, A. M. Talbot and D. L. Groat.

Mrs. Morgan, of Alma addressed the W. R. C. in a very appropriate speech. Numerous prominent people were here from this state and Kansas. On Wednesday evening an interesting camp fire was held by the soldier boys which was addressed by Comrades, Chaney, Cole, Gage and others, and the war scenes of other days were related in an interesting manner, and loudly applauded.

On Thursday the band contest and parade took place. At 8:30 the parade was formed and passed through the streets in the following order:

The procession marched through the principal streets and then marched in review in front of the Gardner house where they were reviewed by Gov. Gabb, Col. Hoover, Col. Gage and others. At the conclusion of the parade the Hon. Tom Majors of Nemaha made a fine address to the vast audience which was variously estimated at from three to five thousand people. The foraging brigade created great excitement when they were marched up the main street by General Tom Hatfield, and ordered to skirmish for eatables. The boys in blue took to it as of yore, and when they returned they were laden with all kinds of provender, such as, cows, chickens, chops, water-melons, apples etc. The brigade took their goods into camp, and were ordered to divulge and then disperse. About 300 old soldiers registered up to Friday night.

The Franklin cadets were one of the interesting features of the reunion. It is composed of manly looking and soldierly bearing young men, who some day will make their mark in the world.

In the evening another grand camp fire was held. In fact the whole reunion was a grand success, and was much more than was expected for the short time which the Red Cloud boys had to prepare for the affair. Much credit should be given to Garfield post for their able efforts to make the reunion a success.
