### THE CONVENTION.

The Republicans of Webster County Meet in Convention and NOMINATE COUNTY OFFICIALS.

Per, call the republican county convention met in this city today, (Friday, Sept. 20th) and proceeded to nominate candidates for county offices. The convention was duly called to order and W. E. Thorne of Bladen was chosen chairman and W. T. Johnson of Cowles, secretary. A committee of five were elected on credentials and the convention adjourned until 1 p. m. After dinner the convention reassembled, and the committee on credentials reported that they found the various delegation all right, and accordingly were accepted.

The convention then proceeded to the nomination of candidates. C. L. Funck and Geo. L. Burr were elected as tellers. Everything being in readiness the ballot was taken for county clerk which resulted in the nomination of H. D. Banney of Blue Hill by a vote of 69.

The vote for treasurer resulted in the nomination of Geo. W. Hummell by 58 votes.

For sheriff the vote stood 56 for Chas. A. Teel of Cowles, and he was declared the nominee of the convention.

For county judge D. F. Trunkey of Amboy was the unanimous choice by a vote of 71.

The rules were then suspended and Miss Eva J. King was declared the unanimous choice of the convention for county superintendent of public instruction.

W. E. Thorn was nominated county surveyor without opposition. Dr. Schenck was nominated for coroner unanimously.

The ticket is one that is above reproach and Tax Cuzer can support each and every man cheerfully and with a hearty good will. While Tax Cuzer would have been pleased to have seen all of its numerous friends nominated, yet there was only room for one person in each office and hence necessitated a failure on the part of many to secure the nomination.
