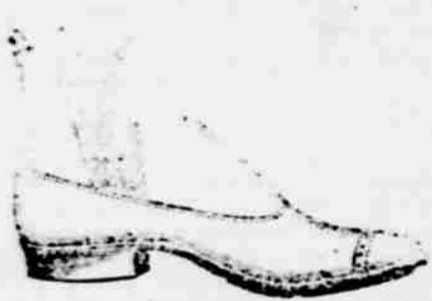

### THE WEBSTER COUNTY FAIR.

The Most Successful Exhibition Ever Held.

The 17th annual exhibition of the Webster county fair which ended today was one of the best fairs, financially and agriculturally ever held in this county, with one or two exceptions. The exhibition of live stock was very fine as was also the display of agricultural products. In the line of agriculture we noticed many evidences that would go to show that Webster county need not take a back seat for any county in the state. Fine corn, fine millet, fine potatoes, fine melons, and everything in that line that could not be possibly beaten by any state in the union. The horticultural department was well filled with beautiful native fruits of all kinds, and in many respects the fruits equaled those of the celebrated California varieties.

In the fine art departments the ladies of our city and county showed themselves equal to the occasion as the display was very fine and had we more time and room we should give the various articles the very proper mention that they deserve. We also noticed several displays made by our merchants, viz: Hacker & Parker, C. L. Cotting, F. V. Taylor, Mrs. S. F. Spokesfield, Mrs. G. S. Alden, Mr. Haines and others.

The school children's department was very fine and makes up one of the handsomest as well as the most intellectual exhibitions that have been produced at any former fair.

In the poultry department Mr. J. Severn's of Guide Rock was the only exhibitor, but his collection was the finest that we have ever seen at any fair in the state and deserve much credit. In fact every one seemed to try and outdo the other.

The horse, cattle and swine exhibit was excellent and some of the specimens would be hard to beat in any state.

In the speeding department we must say that that part of the program was carried out better than in any former year, and much credit is to be placed on the management for stopping the usual foolishness in starting the horses.

The chariot races were the great center of attraction and drew hundreds of people who never attend fairs. It was a novelty and one that took, which goes to show that fairs to be a success must have an attractive program and the present fair was wholly due to the fact that the management furnished an entertainment that the people could appreciate. During Thursday and Friday fully 10,000 people attended the fair. The management and the people should feel good over the success of the fair.

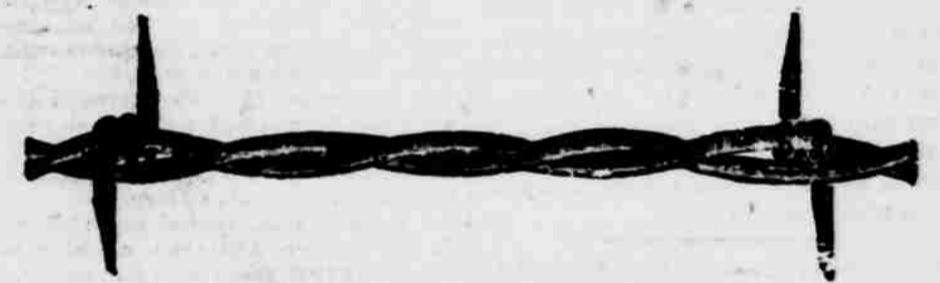
