Come in and see for yourselves. Red Cloud Goes Eastward. During the last year ending January 1, the B. & M. received and shipped away from this station the following number of cars. FREIGHT RECEIVED. Salt 9 Cars, Lumber 2 " Coal 41 " Miscellaneous 12 " Total 68 " FREIGHT FORWARDED. Stock shipped 100 Cars, Flour 1 " Grain 2 " Miscellaneous 1 " Total 104 " These two added together made a grand total of 609 for the year 1889. This shows an immense business for Red Cloud when you take into consideration that the times for the last year have been hard and agricultural products scarce. Next year the shipments will be far in excess of the above. Through the courtesy of the B. & M. officials we have been permitted to use the figures for publication.
