That in considering the pension claims of dependent parents under the provisions of this act, the fact of the death of the solider and sail r and the fact that he left no widow or minor child, or children, having been shown as required by law, it shall then be necessary to show by competent and suffinecessary to show by competent and sufficient vidence that such parent or parents are without other means of support than their own labor and the contributions of others flot legally bound for their support; provided, that all pensions allowed to dependent parents under this a t shall com-mence from the date of the fling of the ap-plication her wader and shall continue no long-r than the existence of their depend

Sec. 2. That all persons who served three months or more in the military or naval service of the United States during the late war of the rebell on, and who have been hence ably discharged therefrom, and who are n who may bereafter be suffering from mental or physical disability, not the result of their own victous habits, which incapiels tates them from the performance of later in on hadegree as to render them unable to earn a support, and who are dependent upon their daily later or the centributions of others not legally bound thereto for their support, shall, upon making due proof of the fact according to such rules and regulations as the Secretary of the Interior may provide be placed upon the list of invalid pensoners of the United State and be entitled to receive - dollars per month, and such pensions shall commence from the date of the tling of the application in the pension office after the pa-sage of this act upon proof that the disability then existed, and shall continue during the existence of the same.

Provided, that persons who are now re-ceiving pensions under ex sting laws or whose claims are pending in the pension of See, may, by appleation to the Commis-sioner of Pensions, in such form as he in y prescribe, showing themselves entitled thereto, receive the benefits of the act; and nothing herein contained shall be construed as to prevent any pensioner thereunder from prosecuting his ciaim and receiving his pension under any other general or special set; provided, however, that no per on shall receive more than one pension the same period, and provided that rank in the service shall not be cons dered in appli-

cations filed under this act.
Sec. 3. That if any officer or enliste! man who served three months or more in the army or navy of the United States during the late war of the rebell on and who was honorably discharged, and has died, or shall hereafter die, leaving a widow, minor child or children, a dependent mother or father. as such dependency is defined under section l of this act, such widow, minor child or children, or mother or father, shall be placed on the pension roll at the rates established for them by law without regard to the cause of death of such officer or enlisted man; provided, that the cause of death of such officer or enlisted man was or is not due to a violation of the civil or military laws, or the result of vicious habits, and that said widow was married to the decossed p-naioner prior to the pass goof this act. All pensions granted to widows under this act shall take effect from the date of the death of the husbands of such willows, but not dating back of the passage of this act. Sec. 4. That from the date of the passage

of this act the increase of pensions for mines children shall be at the rate of 14 per menth instead of \$1 per mont as now provided by iaw, and in case a minor child is insane, idl the ar otherwise helpless the pension child continue during the life of said child or during the period of such disability.

FORMAL NOTICE.

Cattlemen Must Take Their Property Out of the Indian Territory.

WASHINGTON, April 1.-The Commissioner of Indian Affairs, in accordance with instructions of the Secretary of the Interior, has issued a notice to all whom It may concern, whether white men or Indians, that all cattle and other livestock held on any Indian land in the Indian Territory under any pretended contract or arrangement with the Indians for the use and occupation of any part of any Indian lands for grazing purposes, must be removed not later than October I, 1890, and so much earlier as any special circumstances affecting the lands or concerning any of the cattle may make such removal necessary.

This removal is based upon a decision of the Attorney-General, who holds that in the absence or any law derived from treaty or statutory provision Indian tribes can not lease their reservations.

The effect of this notice in conjunction with the President's proclamation of February 17, 1890, will be the removal of all the cattle from every part of the Iudian Territory by October next. whether on expired leases or not. The Indian agents there are instructed to see that this notice is served and enforced.

Fire in a Convent.

MILWAUKER, Wis. April 1 .- Fire broke out last evening about nine o'clock in St. Joseph's Catholic convent on Greenfield avenue, and the entire building and contents were burned, the seventy-five occupants barely escaping with their lives and having no time to save any of their belongings. The fire started from the furnace and was carried quickly through the building by rentilator shafts

Sister Blank, who was on the fourth floor, finding escape cut off, jumped from a window, breaking her leg and all of ter ribs. She can not live.

Two young candidates, Rose Minet and Mary Werner, jumped from the third story windows and were injured.

Thomas Cornell Dead. KINGSTON, N. Y., April 1.—Thomas Corpell, one of the oldest railroad and steamboat men in the State, died yesterday of pneumonia after a few days' illness. He was born at White Plains. West Chester County, N. Y., in 1854. In 1863 he came to Rondout and started a steamboot transportation business between that point and New York, which nerged into the Cornell Steamboat Company, which is now the largest and most important company engaged in river transportation in New York. He was an ardent Republican, and repre-tented this district in the Fortieth and Forty-seventh Congresses.

NEW TARIFF BILL.

Washington, April L-At a special secting of the Ways and Means Comtilttee yesterday Chairman McKinley presented the Republican Tariff bill. The minority will be allowed ten days a which to offer amendments and premre their views before the bill is reported to the House. The bill, according to Chairman McKinley, will effect a reduction of \$45,000,000.


