

The Tariff on Wool.
Some of the free trade papers assert that never before were people of the United States clamoring more loudly for cheaper woolen clothing, and hence it is the duty of congress to admit them free of duty. Well when was it in the history of the world that woolen goods were cheaper than they are to-day? And if the experiment of free wool and woolens will, as the wool growers and manufacturers claim, drive them out of the business because it would reduce their remuneration below cost point to have the cheaper wools of South America and Australia dumped duty free on our market and another year or two would see the industry dead and it can easily be killed off in a year or two, how cheap would wool be then and woolen goods? Our manufacturers of woolen goods which are almost wholly supplied with home-grown wool during the current year, are estimated by anti-tariff agents the Chicago Tribune at \$487,000,000 and of imported wools at \$487,000,000. Suppose we added \$487,000,000 to our imports and got no wool or woolens at home? Does any blockhead flatter himself that woolen goods would be cheaper?

And if as the Tribune avers, the cost of the woolen goods to-day is increased on every purchase by the amount of the tariff laid on such goods that are imported, does he imagine that the woolen manufacturers who make according to these calculations of the statisticians about eight per cent on their investment, could they make a dollar with the duty taken off and if they could not, would not every woolen manufacturer close up? Then where would we be? Woolen goods would go down with a vengeance, wouldn't they?
Since the tariff was laid on wool and woolen goods by the Republican party all woolen goods have decreased in price from thirty to fifty per cent and labor was cheaper when the tariff went into effect than now. Then who has lost by the tariff? Certainly neither the laborer who makes the goods in this country or the consumer of those goods. Then, why monkey with the tariff?—Ex.
