We didn't have a democratic paper in the county, while the republicans had two and the alliance one, but the vote showed republicans 1,292, democrats 1010, alliance 753. The other parties did all the stamping, but we came out pretty well with the votes."

"What figure will the alliance cut in 1892?" That depends altogether on the legislation of the democratic congress. If it is satisfactory to the farmers, the alliance will be a thing of the past, but if it is not, there will be every quantity of alliance men in the succeeding congress, and they would elect a speaker. The work of the next congress will have a very heavy bearing on the result in 1892.
