DORSEY EDWARDS was hanged at Yazoo City, Miss., for the murder of his wife in September last. The twenty-sixth Ward Bank of Brooklyn, which Dittus Jewell, former president of the Brooklyn Bank, is president, was robbed of a package containing \$5,000 in bills. The work is supposed to be that of a band of clever thieves.

W. S. WHARTON, the Chicago broker who was arrested in Philadelphia on the charge of swindling a number of persons in that city out of amounts aggregating about \$50,000, was committed to the action of the Illinois authorities.

NEBRASKA STATE NEWS

JAY GOULD, a well-known freight broker, got into trouble lately by introducing Mrs. Maggie Bradford, a local chambermaid, as his wife.
