By request of our county superin tendent, D. M. Hunter, we publish be low House Roll No. 272, which is a bill passed by our last legislature to provide cheaper text books, and for district ownership of same.

Sec. 1. District school boards and boards of trustees of high school districts and boards of education in cities of the first and second class, are hereby empowered and it is made their duty to purchase all text books necessary for the schools of such district; and they are further authorized to enter into contracts hereinafter provided with the publishers of such books for a term of years, not to exceed five; providing that the contract prices of such books shall not exceed the lowest price then granted to any dealer, state, county, township, school district, or other in-

States to be determined as hereinafter provided; and provided, that such contract shall guarantee to such district
