Statutes Need Repairs to Prevent an Ove Washing Flood.
Washington, June 6.—Gen. James G. O'Berne, deputy commissioner of immigration at New York, who is in Washington conferring with the treasury officials about immigration matters, says the new immigration law, while effective as far as it goes, is not yet comprehensive enough, and that congress will be compelled to amend next winter. The law, he thinks, lacks the positiveness
