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NEBRASKA STATE NEWS.

Nebraska Independents.

The independent state convention met at Hastings on the 17th for the purpose of nominating a candidate for associate justice of the supreme court and two regents of the state university.

TWO boys were drawn into a sewer and drowned during a recent heavy rainstorm at Indianapolis, Ind.

EIGHT miners were killed by an explosion of gas powder in the lower section of the Black Bear mine near Burke, Idaho. The tunnel was caved in for 100 feet.

AT Toronto, Ont., the Society of American Florists elected James Dean, of Day Ridge, N. Y., president.

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AWFUL DISASTER.

Boiler Explosion in a Basement at New York.

NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—A most disastrous and terrible explosion occurred Saturday afternoon at 12:30 o'clock in Park place, between Greenwich street and College place, just at the time when the street was filled with hurrying people.

Without a moment's warning a whole block of buildings swarming with busy workmen collapsed as the result of a mysterious explosion, and an appalling loss of life and property resulted.

The number of the dead is fully estimated at from fifteen to twenty, and only a thorough search of the ruins will establish the full extent of the calamity.
