The instrument specifies that the and in question is to be used only as an outlet and the law annexes the qualfication that it can be used for no other purpose. If a qualified or base for the qualification or circumstances ipon whose existence or non-existence the estate depends, enters into the limitation, it becomes an integral part of the estate itself, and when the state of affairs comes to an end the estate adopted: itself ipso facto ceases.

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
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
