AN IMPORTANT BILL—The Royal Baking Powder condemned in the New York Legislature.

(New York Press.) Last Monday Mr. Kelly introduced the following bill in the assembly. A careful reading of it will show that it is a very important one.

AN Act to prevent the use of poisonous and injurious ingredients in baking powders.

WHEREAS, Baking Powders manufactured in this state, known as the "ROYAL" alum and other Baking Powders are advertised for sale as absolutely pure; and

WHEREAS, Official examination show them to contain ammonia and other injurious ingredients, therefore the People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1.—Every can or package of baking powder containing Ammonia offered for sale in this State shall have a conspicuous label thereon with the words "Contains Ammonia" printed in plain type, not smaller than great primer and any person who shall sell, or have, or offer for sale, any such can or package of baking powder without such label thereon, shall be guilty of misdemeanor.

Section 2.—This act shall take effect July 1, 1891.

**About the Size of It.**  
Mr. George Aspinwall, Kearney, Neb.—Dear Sir:—I regret to say that the present owners refuse to extend, or renew the real estate loans mentioned in your favor of the 20th inst.

It is not probable that any of the loans you made for us a few years ago can be extended or renewed until the agitation for legislation and a judiciary, adverse to the interest of the eastern owners of western mortgages, disappears.

The investors in Nebraska, mortgages are now thoroughly armed and clamoring for the return of the money already loaned; unless confidence is restored in some way, universal bankruptcy in a large portion of the state, seems inevitable.

Confidence in the desirability of western real estate loans waned as the Alliance increased in strength, and when it became known that the party had elected a majority of our last Legislature the sale of mortgages almost entirely ceased. It is true no unfriendly legislation occurred, but capital is timid apprehension widespread, and has been kept alive by reports that some of our district judges are inclined to make the collection of mortgage loans a tedious proceeding. It will require considerable time to allay such distrust, and no progress in that direction can be made so long as there is a possibility of electing the Alliance candidate for Judge of the Supreme Court.

It is on the other hand Judge Post, is elected, that fact, together with the failure of unfriendly legislation last winter, will greatly aid in restoring confidence, and eventually enable borrowers to obtain eastern money.

In other words if the people of this state show by their votes at the coming election, that honest debts are to be honestly paid at the time agreed upon, there will be very few Nebraska mortgages foreclosed, and a full supply of money for all legitimate demands will soon appear.

This is not a question of politics, but rather of honesty and good credit, without which thousands of people in this state will be ruined. Yours truly,

We have a letter in our possession stating that there are people who say that the State Supt. furnishes the office of county Supt. with forms and questions so that one person can be superintendent as well as another.

The state superintendent does furnish questions for use in the examination of teachers; but he does not furnish answers for them, neither does he furnish ability to grade the answers to the questions properly. He furnishes legal blanks also for use in the office, for the use of school boards and for teachers, but experience teaches us that "one person as well as another cannot even fill them out properly."

We see no argument in the letter why a second grade certificate teacher should be elected to the office of county superintendent.

If we lower the qualifications required for county superintendent, lower the grade of teachers, and thus deprive the children of proper instruction, what will result? You answer.
