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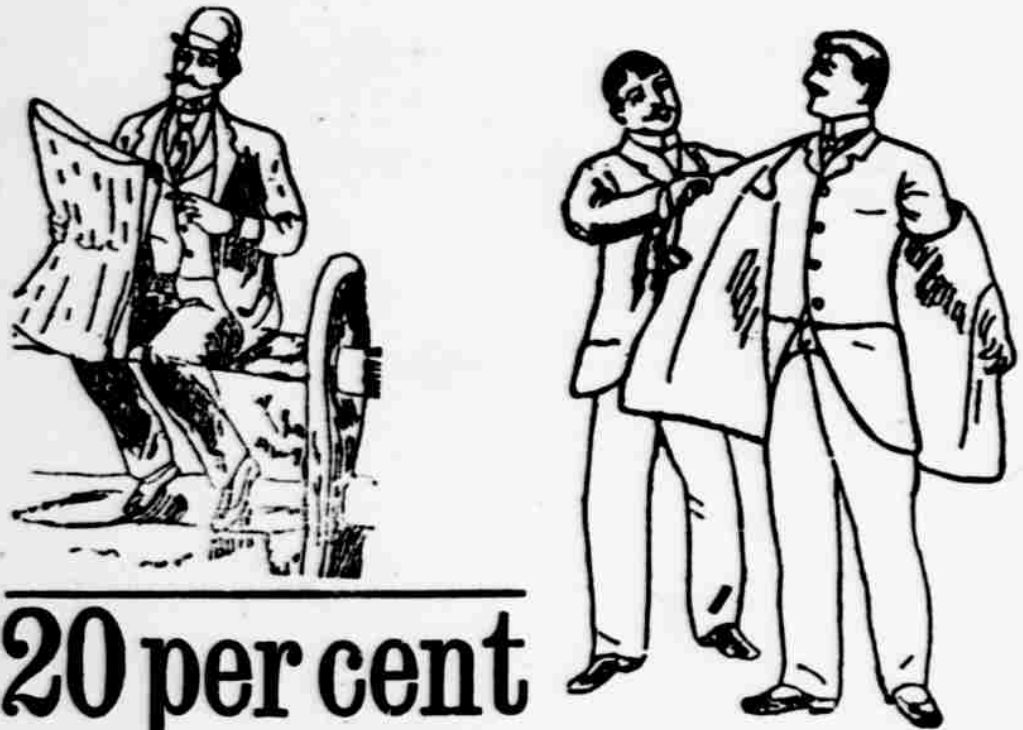

The New York Press exposes that "important Bill" business.

Charlotte E. Schenck was born in Parke county, Ind., December 17, 1852, and died near Cowles, Webster county, Neb., Nov. 23, 1891.

In 1857, with her parents, she was removed to Iowa, and in 1873, she was married to Geo. T. Clark. Five years later she came to this county where they have since lived. Four children, a son and three daughters are left to mourn their irretrievable loss. The husband and father has sustained an almost infinite loss while his increased responsibilities are very great.

Sister Clark was the daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Schenck, of this city. In early childhood she was converted and became connected with the M. E. church.

The wife has been told that during all her life she was thoughtful, truthful and prayerful, living a consistent Christian life.

She was interested in every good cause, especially so in the temperance reformation, being an active member of the W. C. T. U. Having ability with pen and voice, she was enabled to render great assistance in that worthy organization of Christian women.

Her last sickness was brief. On Thursday preceding her death she was attacked with inflammation of the bowels. All efforts to afford relief failing, her vital forces soon gave way.

Rev. E. J. Rendall, of this city, was called to preach the funeral in the M. E. church of Cowles, as desired by the pastor. By request of the family, Ps. 103, 13 to 17, inclusive, was used as the text. There was a large attendance of neighbors and friends, deep feeling and great sympathy were manifest.
