

WANT PEACE.

English Liberals Oppose Lord Salisbury's Policy.

ONLY TORY ORGANS SUPPORT HIM.

The Two British Vessels Seized Last Year Have Started For Behring Sea, While the American Were Labeled and Condemned.

LONDON, March 12.—Lord Salisbury's delay in arranging for a renewal of the *modus vivendi* in the Behring sea matter has been a matter for private consideration by the leaders of the opposition, resulting in a decision not to move in the matter until the policy of the government appears more definite. The foreign office is unusually dilatory in the production of the papers in the case. Apart from the extreme tory organs, the opinion of the country is dead against Lord Salisbury for risking a quarrel with the United States for the sake of the small capital invested in fish boats.

Today's number of the Speaker indicates the attitude of the liberals in arguing that the reasons that induced Lord Salisbury to agree to the *modus vivendi* in 1891 apply with equal force in favor of a renewal in 1892; that if the English government is confident of the strength of its case there is all the greater cause to be content to await the decision of the arbitration tribunal and to be ready meanwhile to meet the Washington executive on a provisional arrangement.

STARTED FOR BEHRING SEA. WASHINGTON, March 12.—The two British vessels seized in Behring sea last year for violating the terms of the *modus vivendi* and turned over to the British authorities for prosecution under that agreement, are said to be among the vessels that have already started for the sealing grounds. These vessels are the *Otto* and *E. F. Martin*. So far as known the British government has not instituted proceedings against them. On the other hand the *Laninma* and *Ethel*, two American vessels seized for exactly the same offense, were labeled and condemned by the United States courts. The four vessels named were the only ones seized last year for illegal sealing, and there was considerable adverse comment in official circles yesterday in regard to the radically different action of the two governments in a matter upon which at the time they were supposed to be in full accord.

MEETING OF THE CABINET. WASHINGTON, March 12.—The Behring sea question was again considered at yesterday's meeting of the cabinet. In the absence of any reply from Lord Salisbury in regard to a renewal of the *modus vivendi*, it is understood no action was taken. Secretaries Blaine, Foster and Noble were the absentees. The session was shorter than usual and at its close a member said, in reply to an inquiry on the subject, that there was no new developments in the Behring sea matter.

A BURGLAR SENTENCED.

Said to Have Been Associated With Hedspeth and Sly. ALBANY, Mo., March 11.—In the circuit court of Geny county Charles Montgomery, known to police officers and detectives throughout the United States as Charles St. John and by other aliases, pleaded guilty to burglary yesterday, receiving a sentence of four years in the penitentiary. Montgomery's picture is conspicuous in many rogues' galleries. It is not improbable that Montgomery helped to plan the Glendale train robbery, if he was not a participant, as he is positively known to have been associated with Hedspeth and Sly. He was an expert safe-breaker and post office robber, his success being promoted by his wife, who is said to have been the treasurer of the gang for several years. Her principal headquarters were at Chicago and Kansas City, Kan. Montgomery served two terms in the Illinois penitentiary for safe-cracking, one term in Kentucky and one in Missouri. Previous to his professional trip to Northwest Missouri he operated in Arkansas.

AN INTERESTING SUIT ENDED.

Money Paid For Bank Stock, Which Afterwards Became Worthless, Recovered. HASTINGS, Neb., March 12.—An important case was settled in the district court yesterday morning. About two years ago H. Bostwick, president of the City National bank, sold M. A. Hartigan, of this city, \$1,000 worth of bank stock at a premium. In less than a year after the City National bank closed its doors. Mr. Hartigan brought suit against Mr. Bostwick to recover the amount of his stock and interest. He set up a plea of fraud in his petition, and the jury brought in a verdict for the plaintiff in the sum of \$1,500, this being the full amount asked with interest. The case has been watched with considerable interest, and the outcome may lead to other suits of a similar nature being brought against Mr. Bostwick.

Jailed on a Terrible Charge.

GUTHRIE, Ok., March 12.—Bristol Leonard, aged 50, a wealthy farmer of Oklahoma county, a church trustee and a Sunday school superintendent, was jailed last night, charged with debauching six little girls from 8 to 12 years old.

Poisoned by Mince Pie.

HIAWATHA, Kan., March 12.—Jerry Hania, a Missouri Pacific brakeman, was poisoned at Weeping Water by eating mince pie. He is under a physician's care.

In a Critical Condition.

LONDON, March 12.—Mrs. Osborne, after her sentence yesterday, developed hysterio-catalepsy so seriously that her condition last night was critical.

TREATY UNDER FIRE.

The Behring Sea Dispute and the Treaty With Great Britain Considered in Executive Session of the Senate. WASHINGTON, March 10.—The senate spent nearly three hours yesterday in the consideration of the Behring sea seal fishery question. The subject came before it through the presentation by the vice-president of the president's message transmitting the correspondence on the subject since May 4, 1891, between this government and the government of Great Britain. The president's message of transmittal was read and in answer to a general demand a great deal of the correspondence was also read by the executive clerk for the information of the senators.

The treaty was debated at considerable length by senators, a majority seemingly favoring an amendment. It was the common understanding that the treaty should be kept before the senate until the correspondence had progressed sufficiently to allow the senators to form an idea as to the attitude which Great Britain intends finally to assume in response to the *modus vivendi*.

PROVISIONS OF THE TREATY. WASHINGTON, March 10.—The preamble to the arbitration treaty submitted to the senate by the president yesterday recites the desire of the government of the United States and Great Britain for an amicable settlement of the questions arising between them concerning jurisdictional rights of the United States in Behring sea and the plenipotentiaries—Secretary Blaine and Sir Julian Pauncefote—have agreed to the treaty.

The first article of the document recites that the questions mentioned in the preamble shall be submitted to a tribunal of arbitration to be composed of seven arbitrators—two to be named by the president of the United States, two by her majesty, the president of the French republic is to be requested to name one, the king of Italy to name one and the king of Sweden and Norway to name one. The seven arbitrators are to be jurists of distinguished reputation and their respective countries. In the event of the failure of the three last named persons to designate arbitrators within two months after request, then the vacancy is to be filled in such manner as the contracting parties shall agree.

SHOT TO DEATH.

Three Negroes Who Shot Several Officers at Memphis Lynched by Masked Men. MEMPHIS, Tenn., March 10.—About 3 o'clock this morning seventy-five men, all wearing black masks, appeared suddenly on Front street near the jail. From whence they came no one would this morning hazard even a guess. No one knew them to assemble, no officer of the law noticed their passage through any street, nor did any person intercept them in their quick and quiet march to Shelby county jail.
