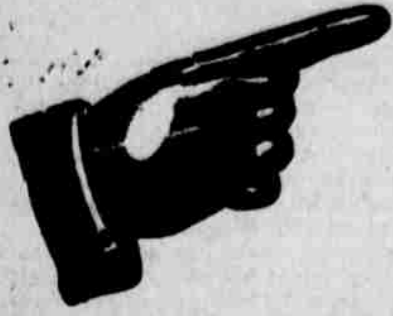

The Fifth District Convention.

Every county in the district was represented by a full delegation. The delegates cheered the name of Harrison and went wild when Blaine was mentioned. It was a gathering of farmers who met at Holdrege and elected delegates to the Minneapolis convention. "John Powers will be the independent candidate for governor. He is the choice of the party by a majority of 20,000—Stevens, of Furnace. "There is such a thing as paying too much for whistles and—harmony" remarked a delegate in the fifth district republican convention. "The mission of the republican party is to dignify labor; the mission of the independent party seems to be to dignify those who do not labor."—Colonel E. D. Webster in the Holdrege convention. The scheme to instruct the delegates elected from the fifth district to vote for Roosevelt for member of the national committee was dropped like a hot potato when the pulse of the delegates had been felt. The republican party will live as long as truth lives and the Christian religion continues. Republicanism is God's truth and the republican party was created to emphasize it.—Colonel E. D. Webster in the fifth district convention. Council Proceedings.

Red Cloud, Neb., May 11, '92, 7:30 p. m. Council met pursuant to adjournment, Mayor Spanogle presiding. Roll call of aldermen. Present—Potter, Pulsifer, Kubelok. Minutes of last session read and approved as recorded. Bill of city clerk for office rent of past year allowed, and warrant for \$24 ordered drawn in payment of same. In the matter of the application of Nelson Longton to vend malt, spirituous and vinous liquors the ensuing year, it was moved by Ald. Kubelok, seconded by Pulsifer, that the bond of Nelson Longton as principal and John Bessch, Thomas Leigh, L. D. Oatman, J. D. Heines, John Sargeon and M. E. Marsh as sureties, be accepted and that city clerk be instructed to issue license as prayed for. The council being polled, the following members voting yea: Potter, Kubelok and Pulsifer. Motion carried and so ordered recorded. On motion Ald. Kubelok, seconded by Pulsifer, the bill of Henry Cook for medicine furnished poor, to the amount of \$22.30 be allowed and warrant ordered drawn in payment of same. L. F. Albright was before the council and asked permission to put in scales on 4th Ave., east of Webster St., and the privilege of removing the same at pleasure. On motion Ald. Potter, seconded by Kubelok, the request was granted. Voting yea: Potter, Myers, Pulsifer and Kubelok.

It was moved by Ald. Myers that T. J. Ward be appointed street commissioner, and that salary for same, together with salary from other city offices, be made equal to \$50 per month for the ensuing year, provided the services as street commissioner is satisfactory to the council. Carried by full vote of council. The following ordinance was called up by Ald. Potter on its third and final reading and vote of council taken on adoption. Voting yea: Myers, Potter, Pulsifer and Kubelok. The motion to adopt ordinance having received the required No. of votes, the ordinance was ordered published as required by law.

Ordinance No. 55. An ordinance amending section four of Ordinance No. 45, entitled, an ordinance providing for the levying and collecting of a license tax on occupation and business carried on within the limits of the city of Red Cloud, Nebraska, to regulate the same and to repeal ordinance No. 32, entitled, an ordinance relative to licensing peddlers, booth stands or stall keepers, wheel of fortune, circuses, menageries, side shows, revolving wheels and shooting galleries.

Be it ordained by the mayor and council of the city of Red Cloud, Neb. Sec 1. That section four (4) of ordinance No. forty-five (45), entitled, an ordinance providing for the levying and collecting of a license tax on occupation and business carried on within the limits of the city of Red Cloud, Neb., to regulate the same and to repeal ordinance No. 32, entitled, an ordinance relative to licensing peddlers, booth stands or stall keepers, wheel of fortune, circuses, menageries, side shows, revolving swings and shooting galleries, be amended to read as follows: Any and all fire insurance companies doing business in the city of Red Cloud, Nebraska, shall pay into the city treasury the sum of five (5) dollars per year. Sec 2. That all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance be and the same is hereby repealed. Sec 3. This ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its adoption and publication according to law. Passed this 11th day of May, 1892. D. B. SPANOGLE, Mayor. Attest, T. J. WARD, City Clerk.
