There has been considerable talk on the streets of the city regarding the merits in breeding and speed of some of the trotting stallions making the season here. We are always ready to welcome a horseman to our midst and we think the more high bred horses raised here the better it is for this community, but we dislike to hear a person get out and say "I have the best bred, I have the speediest horse in the city or in Southern Nebraska," unless he is willing to back his opinion with the check-ols.

Now about breeding: The horse Noah Burah, by Pretender, by Dictator dam by Glenarce by Harold etc., is certainly a very high bred horse but we think that Mr. John Gilbert, the gentlemanly proprietor of the Red Cloud Stock Farm, has one equally, as well bred. We shall see by their breeding: Maximum is by Med- rid one of the best bred sons of the great George Wilkes, who has 68 in the 2:30 list and stands second to Electioneer, and have 681 races won to their credit. His dam is Idyl by Challenger the most royal- ly bred of the sons of Almost 25, son of Alexander Abball's sire of that peerless mare Goldsmith Maid 2:14, and we find the traces back to Hambletonian 10 on both sides and that all his ancestors are highly bred. Now we take Dictator, the grand sire of Noah Burah. We find that he has only 83 in the 2:30 list and they have won 102 races, and although his dam is by a son of Harold the sire of Head B, as a family they have never been consistent performers and when I say that the horse Maximum, grandson of the great George Wilkes is so fashionably bred as the grandson of Dictator, I think I may safely say that any student of breeding will agree with me. When it comes to talking about trotting, we are author- ized to say that Doc Moranville is willing to put in \$100 and let any stallion owner in the county put in \$100 in the behalf of any stallion now owned in this county and not for the money, the winner to take the entire purse, the loser to be trotted at the Webster county fair, this fall, and undoubtedly the county would add some money. May we not say that the Doc- tor's nomination is Primer Arthur who is as fine an individual horse as there is in the county.
