On Monday, June 27, at 1 o'clock p. m. the Webster county Teachers' Institute opened. There was an enrollment of fifty-seven, work for the next day was assigned, and plans for the institute were stated.

We were careful to select only such instructors as could be relied upon to do good work. Those who are leading our teachers in their efforts to improve are as good as any, and better than many who profess to be institute instructors.

She gives instruction in grammar, composition, drawing and penmanship.

Mrs. Eva J. Case has consented to give instruction in the study of U. S. history. Her ability as teacher and superintendent is generally recognized by the people of Webster county. Nothing that we can say will enlighten any one, interested in the educational affairs of the county, as to her fitness to instruct. She can be trusted with any of the educational work of our county.
