Obituary.

Died at his home at Sherwood, Kansas on June 27th, 1892, Rev. John E. Elliott. Rev. Elliott was born August 9, 1820, in Yates county, New York, and in accordance, was 71 years, 10 months and 17 days. Perhaps none in this country was more widely known than the deceased and his scores of friends will be pained to learn of his death, though for months it had been expected. He had been a resident of this county and his late home for about 16 years. Mr. Elliott has been a faithful worker for the Lord since the age of 18 years, and followed this labor until three years ago when on account of ill health his work for the Master was abandoned though he never lost faith in the Savior. In connection with his religious labors he was an excellent M. D. and surgeon and until old age and sickness over came him he had an extensive practice. Dr. Elliott was a good neighbor, and a kind friend to the poor and needy, always a liberal supporter to any public enterprise. In politics Mr. Elliott was a democrat and in 1880 was honored by his party with the nomination of Coroner. The deceased leaves a wife six children, two brothers, three sisters and many other relatives to mourn for his death. The remains were laid to rest in the Orio cemetery by a large concourse of sympathizing friends.
