THE STATE FAIR.

The Nebraska State Fair Exposition, Lincoln, September 2 to 9, 1892—Keep an Eye On It.

The object of the managers of the Nebraska state fair and exposition has ever been to present annually as full and complete a line of resources, products and possibilities of the whole state as can be gathered, thus to advertise and mutually benefit every industry and individual interest known, or to be thought of, in the entire state. The coming year, 1893, being the world's jubilee at Chicago, where all the world will be present to see all the world has to show—and where a great Nebraska exhibit is to be installed,—extra efforts are being made to have the state fair this fall eclipse any of its predecessors. It is desirable that it shall be the "gathering together" of the material for Chicago.

We are officially advised the outlook was never more flattering. The people seem to be full of enthusiasm, and will meet the emergency in a manner characteristic of Nebraskans, and to the satisfaction of the most sanguine expectations. Every man, woman and child in the state should become a self constituted committee of one, upon whom devolves the whole duty of pushing to successful completion this great enterprise.

While the substantial factor is as stated, the board is not forgetful of the important duty to provide for the pleasure and other interests of the public, its patrons. This being a political year special arrangements have been made to give each of the national political organizations of the country, a day on the fair grounds, and an opportunity to present to the crowds there assembled, their respective claims for suffrage. The best talent obtainable to represent each party will be secured. Republicans, democrats, people's independents and prohibitionists of national repute, will address the people. Names of speakers and detailed publication will be made later, we are informed.

An arrangement has been made for the Nebraska state band association to hold its annual reunion on the grounds. This will bring together the most extensive convention ever known in the state, affording the rarest treat in that line our people have ever enjoyed. This feature will continue during fair week, and will be further announced in special publications.

Friday, September 9, is set apart as "Old Soldier's" day, when all soldiers of the late war will be admitted to all parts of the grounds free.

Tuesday, September 6, is children's day, when all children in the state will be on hand and have a good time in sight seeing.

The premiums have been enlarged, in especially for agricultural products and live stock. For county collective exhibits seventeen premiums are offered, ranging from \$30 to \$250. Eighteen premiums are offered for the best quarter of an acre of sugar beets, ranging from \$50 the first, and \$5 the lowest. Ten thousand dollars are offered for speed. Some of the best horses in the country have been secured and more are promised. The races will be an immense attraction this year.

There was never a time when all connected with the state fair was more promising than for the coming one, commencing on the second day of September next. The people of Lincoln are preparing to entertain visitors in unusual style. Special evening entertainments are being provided. Railroad facilities for getting to and

from Lincoln and the fair grounds have been largely increased, rendering such accommodations unsurpassed in any other state or for any other fair.

Harvesting is the order of the day. A lot of spring wheat and not cut yet, some threshing done. Mr. Clarke Stevens threshed 241 bushels of wheat and 92 bushels of rye and has a lot of spring wheat and oats to thresh yet.

Old Mr. Reese the coal prospector, has gone 55 feet deep and has abandoned the works enduring hot weather, though seems to have great faith in a 3 or 4 foot vein of coal at less than 100 feet deep.

A lot of our neighbor boys went down south to help harvest and thresh wheat they expected to get \$2.50 per day. O. Provalt; Albert Scribner and Wm. Dollings was in the crowd, and last accounts they were in Osborn, Osborn county, Kansas.

Mr. Tuff Sutton's team ran off with a hay rack got into a wire fence and nearly ruined one of them, at last accounts it was improving some.

Frank Graham, Dug and Charles Davis, Frank Slabby, Wm. Keen and Mr. Haskins have been running their binders nearly day and night on account of the grain ripening so fast during the few hot days.

Common looking wheat and thin on ground with small grain make 20 bu. to the acre, and a better prospect for corn we never had, common lone handed farmers have out from 25 to 100 acres.
