**The Old Soldier Racket.**

The following resolutions passed at the meeting of alliance editors at Hutchinson, Kansas, recently, has raised a terrible howl by the alliance press of the state, and been declared a "forgery," another "republican lie," etc.

"RESOLVED, That we condemn the organization known as the Grand Army of the Republic, organized for the purpose of preying upon the United States treasury, and thereby finching from the people in the form of pensions, money not their due. We also condemn the membership of said organization for pressing upon and demanding; of the people the right to hold office and be recognized as an active factor in the politics of the country. The right to vote we do not question; but their right to dictate or suggest political action and political party, we denounce, and we the representatives of the reform (alliance) press, do hereby pledge ourselves to resist such presumption on the part generally of the ex-union soldier, but especially of the Grand Army of the Republic."

But the Salina Sun has taken the trouble to investigate the matter, and has run the report down. We give the result below. It will now be proper for the reform (?) press to give the report of the Sun's investigations. Will they do so or will they either declare it another "republican forgery" or remain silent on the subject? We will see.

"It was to get at the bottom facts that a gentleman of this city went to Hutchinson this week and after spending two days there returned yesterday bringing documents that proved conclusively the truth of every assertion made. The resolution was heard by a number of gentlemen of high repute in Hutchinson, who were in the convention at the time of reading.
