It looks as if the democrats did not dare to nominate a candidate for congress in this district, right in the face of the insults heaped upon them by McKeighan at various times and places.

Verily the rich man rides in "shades" while the poor farmer boy keeps right on plowing corn.

THE CHIEF desires to extend its appreciation of Senator Paddock's on Forest Protection, which is entitled a "Bill to provide for the protection of public forest reservations." The provisions of the bill are such that hereafter the forests of the nation will be protected from useless destruction. The bill has been endorsed by the proper committee and is a wise public document showing careful research of the important subject by its author, Senator Paddock. The bill should become a law.

If the people's party propose to work for free trade in order to pauperize the American workingman, they will find their ranks somewhat thinned. You may be able to bamboozle them by demagogery on some questions, but you must not try to decrease or reduce their wages to those of foreign lands, or they will be against you and against you hard. This is what the people's party will do, if they work for free trade and with the democrats. "Choose ye, this day whom ye will serve" free trade and pauper labor, or protection and high wages, that makes the American laborer the equal of every other citizen.

The people of Red Cloud should by all means organize a building association. If there is any one thing that builds up a little town, it is a building association well managed, one that would be worked to the interest of the stockholder and not for the benefit of a few. Such an association would build Red Cloud more good substantial dwellings than any thing else, and give our carpenters and laboring men employment. We can name you several towns where the local building association has made the town grow rapidly, and elevated it into a prosperous city, from a dull, dead place. An effort will be made soon to organize a home association, by that we do not mean, local branches of some foreign institution located in some other state, but a good, sound association located in Red Cloud.

A building association organized and managed properly would wind up its affairs in about ten years. A borrower or if he could get money at ten per cent or a little higher rate, could pay for a nice home in that period, for about the same amount that he would have to pay rent. A building association is a poor man's friend and a means of good investment for a man who does not care to borrow. The money paid each month is loaned out to the applicants in rotation as they apply for it, and therefore no injury could be worked to the stockholder. Let our enterprising men take hold of the building association at once and set Red Cloud to going.

The democrats, through Gov. Boyd, has let the cat out of the bag, and have declared their intention of voting for Weaver, and not for Cleveland, in order to down Harrison. The republicans who belong to the populists, or independent party, should stop and think twice before casting their votes against the republican ticket. There is no hope for Weaver's election, but the democrats in order to make a catapaw of the independents, propose to vote for Weaver and against Cleveland in order to throw the election of president into the house, and thereby elect Cleveland. It is a fair political dodge for the democrats but it will be hard on American workingmen to be made the instrument to decrease wages by free trade with the nations of the world. It would place our American workingmen along side of the cheap labor of Europe and when you compare our wages with theirs you will find them much lower. For instance take the wages of iron workers in Belgium. There they get 65 cents per day and in this country from \$10 to \$15 for the same work. This, then is what democrats propose to do by voting for Weaver, and thus electing Cleveland. Do the workingmen of America want to come in contact with the cheap labor of Europe? It is nice to talk free trade, it sounds pretty in theory but when it comes to putting it in practice in America, if it ever is, it will be a sorrowful day for our country. It would simply mean the pro-titulation of our people to the mere pittance of wages received in England; which every American knows are twice as low as they are here.
