THE GREAT WEST

As Seen by the Rev. E. L. Ely, of this City. (Article 5.)

Leaving Salt Lake City at about 4 p. m., I ran out to Provo City, a city with about 5,000 population a large majority of which are Mormons.

It is situated just at the foot of the Wasatch Mts. and it would seem like only a nice morning walk to take a trip to their top before breakfast but as the snow appears in the gulches near the top it suggests that it is farther up than a prairie dweller would suppose, so it would be wiser to take your breakfast along with you and unless you are a pretty good walker your dinner also.

The city is built on a plan similar to Salt Lake City, and abounds in handsome buildings and a wealth of trees and flowers.

Here the Mormons are in their glory, and yet there are other denominations with churches and schools. The New West Education Commission of the Congregational churches have a flourishing academy here.

I had the pleasure of taking supper here with Mr. Giddings and family recently of Red Cloud. Mr. G. is employed as book-keeper in a lumber office.

At 10:45 p. m. I was again "on the rail" and as I could not see much by starlight, I endeavored to get a little sleep until morning.

Some of the finest scenery along the line however is to be found here including Castle Gate where the R. R. passes between two giant mountains that have been pictured throughout the world.

We breakfasted at Green River, then pass through 19 miles of barren desert then come to a red sandstone formation that presents some strange figures. In one place is a resemblance to a giant elephant 500 feet long lying down. Again in the distance one sees a resemblance to a great city with its towers and domes.

From here the road runs through scenery of varied description, sometimes presenting a dismal uninteresting appearance and again thrilling one with its vast canyons and perpendicular rocks.

At Grand Junction we have our choice of three routes. The standard gauge via Leadville. The Colorado midland via Greenwood Springs through Hagerman Tunnel 11,528 feet above the sea, also through Leadville. Or the narrow gauge through the Black Canyon which was the one I chose.

At Grand Junction a man who had what the newspapers now call a "jag" meaning I suppose a large supply of whisky tried an interesting experiment—That of getting off the train while it was under full headway. He succeeded finely, that is he got off sure enough. The only mistake was in lighting on the wrong end of himself, his head instead of his feet. After getting on his feet and rounding himself up he found he was "all there" and some more. He wasn't quite so drunk, but he had more holes in his head than he had before. However, the doctors got at him and darned up the holes and made quite a head of it after all. More to be admired however as a work of art than desired as a possession.

We were at Montrose for dinner and from that time until evening we passed through scenery such as no human being can describe in language that will convey to the reader anything like a true idea of its grandeur and majesty.

Through the Black Canyon the road winds around the great wall of rocks rising sometimes 3000 feet in height in a perpendicular line, again the great wall extends out over the track startling one with the thought of the great mass of rocks falling on us. Suddenly there springs into sight a little stream of water gushing out of the rocky wall a thousand or more feet above you and dashing in spray on the rocks below. Looking out of the widow on the other side

We see the Gunnison River as it goes dashing on its way over the rocks. It seems as though one's thoughts must turn toward that great Power who caused the mighty convulsions of the earth that brought into being these wonderful formations. Some one in writing of this runs into poetry thus: "God was good to make the mountains, the valleys and the hills; Put the rose upon the cactus, the ripple on the rills; But if I had all the words of all the world's at my command, I couldn't paint a picture of the Canyon of the Grand."

After passing through Black Canyon we begin the ascent of Marshall Pass and here again I must acknowledge my inability to do the subject justice.

With two strong engines we begin winding around the sides of the mountains, sometimes we can see only a few yards of the road ahead or behind us, but all the time going up. Now we go directly east, and in a few moments we are going west. At times we may look back and see what seem to be several tracks but are really sections of the road over which we have come. At one time I saw 5 of them and the smoke of a freight which was following us on another.

The difference in the atmosphere is quite noticeable and when at the top I experienced quite a severe pain in breathing. On the way up and when quite a long way from the top an invalid who took the train at Grand Junction ceased to breathe. It seemed sad to die thus alone as no one on the train knew him, but when they saw his condition all was done that could be. There were many very sober countenances and I noticed particularly the face of the conductor.

At the top in the region of ice and snow even in July, we stopped and the conductor held the train 15 minutes for as many as wished to climb the tower 200 feet high. The altitude of the Pass is nearly 11,000 ft.

In descending the front engine is disconnected and runs ahead a short distance into Salida. I saw going down an exhibition of what is usually considered an impossibility, for two engines to meet and pass on the same track. In one place in going around the head of a canyon the turn is so short that when we are going toward it we met the other engine returning on the other side so near by that we could have spoken to the engineer if they had been standing still. At Salida, we arrived about dark, and just in time to be in a terrific thunder storm that seemed to shake the very mountains.

As the mountains were round about Jerusalem, they are round about this beautiful little city like a giant wall of defence.

I shall always remember Salida for the elegant supper of mountain trout

which were secured at a little restaurant. We left Salida about midnight running through Grand Canyon which exceeds even the Black Canyon in its dizzy height, in the night so I saw nothing of it and ran into Pueblo in the early morning then on through Colorado Springs to Denver in time to miss my train for the east by a half hour so I had to remain there all day. As I put in most of the day sleeping, and Denver is familiar to many of our readers, I will say nothing of it, but in the language of the stump speaker "I thank you for your kind attention"—Although I don't know how attentive you've been—and will bring my letter to a close.

Burlington Beach is one of the great pleasure resorts of Lincoln. The proprietors have a lake one mile wide and two miles long, and a pleasure yacht, with a capacity of 500, which plies upon it. When in Lincoln you should not fail to go to Burlington Beach.
