The great fiasco of endorsing McKeighan at the Democratic convention in this city on Thursday, has finally been enacted and now comes calamity crow for the rooked-ribbed democrats to swallow. We are pleased to note that the endorsement does not meet the approval of the rank and file of the democratic party only the politicians.

The republican league of Nebraska held one of the grandest and most enthusiastic meetings at Grand Island this week that we have ever attended. It was a real love feast and if the same spirit is manifested over the state the republicans will sweep everything this fall. Judge Thurston was the speaker of the day and in his eloquent way expounded republican doctrine that was cheered to the echo. He was followed by others. Messrs. O. C. Bell, L. H. Fort, A. Galusha and THE CHIEF were in attendance from Red Cloud. Over 1,000 delegates were present and the statistics show over 25,000 young men in the league.

W. E. Andrews to open and close the following meetings: Hastings, McCook, Minden, Grand Island and Red Cloud; Hon. W. A. McKeighan to have the opening and closing at the other places named, Sutton, Grant, Nelson and Holdrege.

The "iniquitous force bill" plank of the republican platform reads as follows:

We demand that every citizen of the United States be allowed to cast one free and unrestricted ballot in all public elections and that such ballot be counted and returned as cast; that such laws shall be enacted and enforced as will secure to every citizen, be he rich or poor, native or foreigner, white or black, this sovereign right guaranteed by the constitution. The free and honest popular ballot, the just and equal representation of all the people, as well as their just and equal protection under the laws, are the foundation of our republican institutions, and the party will never relent in its efforts until the integrity of the ballot and the purity of elections shall be fully guaranteed and protected in every state.

Now what honest citizen and patriotic American can find the slightest objection to that declaration of principles?—Journal.
