EDITOR CHIEF:—I must give you a little account of our work at the reunion at Superior. A few of us arrived there Tuesday forenoon. We were met at the depot by Commander Adams and sent by carriage to W. R. C. Headquarters on the camp ground.

We soon "hung our banners on the outer wall" and the committee furnished the interior. Then visitors commenced to come in a steady stream—we could scarcely find time to eat our dinner.

As soon as we could in the afternoon we went up to the Grand Stand to hear the speaking. Mr. McKeehan was just finishing his address so we did not hear much of it. He was followed by his opponent in the Congressional race, Prof. Andrews, and I must say that eloquence flowed from his lips without a seeming effort. He made a grand speech.

The camp fire that evening was all of good things.

Wednesday morning the Relief Corps began to come in. By 8 o'clock our headquarters was crowded full. The acting adjutant, Capt. Murfin, perceiving it, came rushing in, and said Mrs. Knight you must have more room, you can take possession of the Surgeon's headquarters for to-day.

The forenoon exercises consisted of the address of welcome by Mrs. Addie Milting, of Geneva, Neb., the response by Mrs. M. P. Wood, of Burr Oak, Kan, and an address by Mrs. E. H. Alioth, of Cawker City, Kansas. She is one of the original party who organized the National W. R. C. at Denver in 1883. The addresses were

interspersed with songs by the Chester Glee Club.

The Glee Club entertaining the exercises by singing and the band discussing sweet music, between the addresses. The closing song was, "Dropping From the Banks."

A joint camp fire was held in the evening and the W. R. C. presented many good speeches and recitations. We also received and read them a telegram from our beloved past National President, Mary Sears McHenry, sending her greeting to us, and wishing that W. R. C. day might be the brightest and best of the reunion in one or two days stay there, after the 24th we were continually congratulated on the success of our day, many claiming that it was the most interesting day of the reunion.

Will you allow me to close with a quotation from one of the Omaha daily papers, to show what others think of us?

Relief Corps day at Camp Lincoln will never be forgotten by those who were there. It makes an epoch in Grand Army history. Neyer before were so many ladies present, and never before was such deep interest taken. Not only in numbers but in ability was the meeting a remarkable one, and clearly shows that the brightest and best educated of our women, as well as the rank and file, are every year becoming more interested in the task of strewing blessings in the pathway of the falling heroes of the war.
