PUTTING UP FALL STIES.

Litigants Getting into Line for the Opening of the District Court.

The city has another \$5,000 law suit on its hands, growing out of the defective condition of the Leavenworth street cedar block pavement which is now being relaid with brick. Last March M. R. Bentley, a prominent citizen of Red Cloud, was in the city visiting friends on South Twentieth street. One evening, in company with a number of gentlemen friends, he visited the theater. After the performance they walked home, going out on Leavenworth. At the intersection of Nineteenth and Twentieth streets, Mr. Bentley stepped from the curb to the pavement, and in doing so his foot went into one of those holes between the blocks. This resulted in a broken leg. Mr. Bentley was taken to the Dellone hotel, where he was laid up for several weeks. After his recovery he went to the Hot Springs and now has instructed Attorney Trauerman to bring the suit.—Bee.

Mr. Bentley's suit against Omaha, we think is absolutely just and proper, for since the 28th of last March, (the time when he was injured) he has been unable to do business, and the first three months it looked as if he would lose his limb. He has lost nearly six months time and a man with Mr. Bentley's business necessities, means more than a few dollars loss. THE CHIEF thinks that he should be justly remunerated for his injuries which were of a very serious nature, besides a good amount for lost time.

At Rest.

On last Sabbath afternoon at 2 p. m., all that was mortal of Milton Lester was laid to rest in Red Cloud cemetery, with imposing Masonic ceremonies. Mr. Lester was a member in good standing of Charity lodge A. F. & A. M., and of Cyrene Commandry Knights Templar, and of the Eastern Star, also of the Grand Army and Sons of Veterans. All of these societies, including the Relief Corps, turned out in large numbers to pay their last respects to the departed brother who in life was a worthy member. Rev. E. L. Ely, pastor of the Congregational church of this city officiated, and offered appropriate words of consolation to the bereaved wife and son. After the services were over at the house, the procession, nearly one mile in length, moved to the cemetery, where the remains were deposited, the Sons of Veterans band leading, playing a funeral dirge. Mr. Lester was born in Suffield, Connecticut, Oct. 22, 1840, making him almost 52 years of age at his death. In life Mr. Lester made many warm friends, and in death, those friends will have a lasting remembrance of him who has gone before.
