As to McKeighan's discussion of the political situation it was the same old chestnut of thirty years ago, nothing new in it. After the debates are over, and a refusal to conduct them further from fear or otherwise, and in the light that the challenge came from McKeighan, it looks like baby talk, to plead abuse at this time, when in both instances McKeighan was the aggressor, as far as the challenge and abuse were concerned.

The fates have decreed it and he must be relegated to the rear ranks while an abler and more vigorous man takes his place in congress.

**Victory for Andrews.**  
When McKeighan was challenged to continue the joint discussions at Holdrege the republican committee asked that the challenge be either accepted or refused at Red Cloud in order that the debates could continue right along, but up to the present time Mr. McKeighan nor any of the independent committee has answered it and Mr. Andrews and the republican committee accepts the silence as a refusal to continue the debates, and arrangements have been made whereby Mr. Andrews' time will be occupied between this and election.

It is evident that McKeighan and his managers fully realize that they have been worsted at every turn in the road and have no desire to continue further. There silence is a tacit acknowledgement of defeat. When the challenge to Mr. Andrews was made the independents little knew the result. Had they but realized Mr. Andrews' ability to uphold and defend the republican party the challenge would have never been issued.

The debates have resulted in much good to the republican party and the Nebraskan is only sorry that the independents have not accepted the challenge to continue them.—Nebraskan.

Columbus Day was celebrated by the Red Cloud schools in an appropriate manner. To whom it may concern: Notice is hereby given that sealed proposals will be received, at the office of the county clerk of Webster county, Nebraska, up till noon, of November 2, 1892, for the purpose of building a pile bridge, across a creek 1/2 mile north of Cowles, on main road to Blue Hill, according to plans and specifications herein stated, viz: Bridge to be 50 feet long, 16 feet wide, four rows of piling, and 3 piling to each pier, piling to be 14 feet long, driven from 6 to 7 feet, same to be capped by 8x10, caps. Joist to be 2x12 inches, laid 2 feet apart. Floor to be laid with two inch plank. Also a railing on sides of bridge. All to be done in a workmanlike manner.
