**Political Thought.**  
**EDITOR CHIEF:**—In making a forecast of what is to come on the 8th of November, there certainly is abundant reason for our republican adherents to feel hopeful of the best results accruing from this closing campaign of enlightenment; a campaign so decidedly different from that four years ago. In the campaign of 1888, too much was taken for granted, on the part of the republicans, as touching the real understanding of the people on economic and other questions of the day, and, as a result of this overweening confidence, we found that thousands of voters went to the polls and took a leap into the unknown mysteries of the future, with feelings akin to awe, because of their inability to determine as to what the situation demanded. And, having heard it over and over again that the republican party had turned pirate and was devastating the country, as a forlorn hope they voted against the party against which they had heard so much that was damaging, unmanly and unholy. But it was not long until this class of voters began to discover that a mistake had been made somewhere; that all was not as had been represented. They now commenced the work of informing themselves, and soon found that they had made a grave mistake when they turned their backs upon the party that had done more for the common people of our nation than had ever been accomplished by all the other parties combined. They found that the wild and visionary schemes of the populists were in reality, nothing more nor less than the thinnest of subtterfuges—among which were the doctrines of free coinage of silver, popular loans at two per cent, fiat money and the like. They now began a system of reasoning, and, aided by the solid discussions of these and kindred topics they quietly pursued these investigations, until the fact of their having been led astray by these false doctrines began to dawn upon their minds. Then they investigated the robber McKinley bill, and were startled by the discovery that not only the democrats and the populists were contending for what was nothing less than free trade, but that Great Britain was exceedingly wrought up, and greatly disgusted with the robber McKinley bill, and declaring that such a law was working mischief with her foreign trade. Next they examined the reciprocity trade with foreign powers, and found that it did work most admirably. They then took up the ravings of the democratic and populist statesmen over the Force bill, only to find that Mr. Cleveland had called to his aid the powers that be in the shape of United States marshals at the time he was president and sought to be re-elected. Well, that was a hard knock, and let in considerable light. And so the work of enlightening proceeded, quietly, sincerely, honestly, until the dark veil of distrust and almost hatred of their republican brethren fell to the ground. And now through the perseverance of those noble fellows, who at heart were always right, they are once more basking in the sunshine, and though in a quiet and unostentatious manner, are going to the polls to drop into the ballot box their own good, old-fashioned solid republican votes, and thereby place the seal of condemnation upon all this wild and discordant howling for office on the part of not a few of the most consummate liars and political monstrosities the world has ever seen. Of course it is not claimed in this article that there will be a complete victory on the 8th of November, but that the good sense of our people will so curtail this noisy army of office seekers, as to save the country from utter ruin, and again lay the foundation for complete republican rule. Such men as Van Wyck and William Bryan, with a number of lesser lights, will be elected by comparatively small majorities, if at all. But these voters had a constitutional right to vote as they did, and now claim the same right to help to undo the great wrong which they unconsciously helped to fasten upon themselves and others; and they mean to rectify that wrong as far, as in them lies the power, on the 8th day of November, in the year of grace, 1892.
