LINCOLN, Neb., Oct. 17, 1892.—(Personal and confidential.) Dear Sir: I have just returned from the east where I was honored by a consultation with the national committee and leading men of our party, with regard to the best policy to be pursued in Nebraska this fall in dealing with the electoral ticket, and they agreed with me that the wisest course for democrats to support the Weaver electors; the object being to take Nebraska out of our accustomed place in the republican column.

Information has reached me that a number of independents who were former republicans contemplate voting for the Harrison electors. The following challenge was made to W. A. McKeighan and the independent committee at the Holdrege debate and the time of answering the same was specified as the debate at Red Cloud so that if it were accepted the debates could continue right along.

W. A. McKeighan: On August 23, 1892, your committee challenged the Hon. W. E. Andrews republican candidate for congress in this district, to hold not less than six joint discussions with W. A. McKeighan in this district. Your challenge was accepted. We gave you nine, the last of which will take place October 20th at Red Cloud.

The republican committee and Hon. W. E. Andrews desiring to continue the joint debates, hereby offers to continue the said joint debates under the same terms named and embodied in your challenge and our written acceptance of the same; that is to say, we accept for two or four more, if you accept for two only, Mr. McKeighan to open and close the first debate and Mr. Andrews to open and close second debate; if only two more are held the same to be held at Orono, Neb., October 20th (Wednesday) at 8 o'clock p. m. and at Curtis, Neb., on Wednesday, November 2d at 2 o'clock p. m. If you accept for four more, Mr. McKeighan to open and close the first and third debates, and Mr. Andrews to open and close the second and fourth debates. If you accept for four more debates, two of same to be held at places and time above stated, and the other two at places to wit: At Wauwata, Neb., on Monday, October 31st at 2 o'clock p. m. and at Oxford on Thursday, November 3d, at 8 o'clock p. m.

The same time to be allotted to each speaker and divided, and debates to be conducted under same conditions and terms as set forth in your challenge and our written acceptance of the same, reference being made and had thereto.
