A new and novel device has been invented for counting votes at elections, called the McTammany voting machine. It was put to a practical test at the last election at Spencer, Mass., and is said to have worked admirably. The advantages claimed for it are economy, prevention of fraud, accuracy, "deals a deadly blow" at bribery and corruption, affords absolute secrecy, and is a great improvement on the Australian system in the matter of speed. The following description of the machine is from the Spencer (Mass.) Leader of Nov. 12: "The machines are 20 inches long, 14 inches wide and 8 inches deep, and have a capacity for 120 candidates, but their capacity may be increased ad libitum. The machines are placed in the booths, which do not differ in any respect from the booth at present in use. As the voter approaches, his name is checked and he is handed a pencil by the officer in charge of the machines, then he enters the booth, lifts the lid of the machine which rings the bell and at the same time moves the tally sheet within along one degree, simultaneously the registering dial counts one on the outside of the machine which is evident that the first vote has been cast. The top of the machine under the lid referred to is composed of a steel plate in which the ballot or ballots are clamped. The ballot may be the regular official one, divided into pages for convenience in handling, or a specially prepared ballot at present in use which

is much more simple and less confusing to the voter.

Opposite each candidate's name on the ballot there is a slot in the steel plate about one-eighth of an inch wide and three-eighths of an inch long, and under or back of the steel plate a traveling sheet of paper equaling in width the length of the ballot and which can be seen or touched by the point of a pencil through the slot aforesaid. When the voter has selected the candidates of his choice he inserts his pencil in the slot opposite his name and makes a mark on the tally sheet which counts one for that official; in like manner he passes down his tickets selecting his candidates and marking in the slots adjacent to their respective names until he has finished, when he can survey work and make any correction he may deem advisable, or he can vote a mixed or an entirely independent ticket if he elects. Having finished, he lowers the lid and passes out and the next voter in the act of lifting the lid moves out of sight that portion of the tally sheet containing the marks of his predecessor and bringing under the slot blank paper to receive fresh marks."
