Mr. Robert Wilson Jr., of Hastings state traveling agent for The Bradstreet Mercantile Agency, was in town last week on matters connected with his farming interests here.

Mr. Wilson owns a farm in Walnut creek township south of Inavale, on which there was something less than sixty acres of spring and winter wheat that produced 1468 bushels, or an average of 24 1/2 bushels per acre.

One piece of winter wheat measuring 11 acres, 130 rods, produced the phenomenal yield of 654 bushels that weighed out 84 pounds to the bushel, an average of over 55 bushels to the acre, verified measures and weights.

Mr. Wilson was so well pleased with the results of this year's farming that he purchased another 160 acres adjoining and is negotiating for other land there.

He has given the winter wheat question a study for several years and believes that the land of Webster county is peculiarly adapted to the profitable growth of that cereal.

Mr. Wilson's lands are farmed by Mr. Josephus Rosencrans, who is well known as a successful farmer.

**Obituary.**

On Wednesday, December 7, 1892, occurred the death of Mr. G. W. Lindsey, Sr., of dropsy of the heart. The deceased was born in New York state, August 10, 1820; in 1842, was married and moved to Wisconsin. After living there for some time, accompanied by his family, he moved to Paw Paw, Illinois, where he resided until about two years ago, when he came to Red Cloud, since which time he has made his home with his son, Geo. W. Lindsey, Jr., our esteemed townsman. He and his brother, Dennis, are the only ones surviving him, sorrowing the departure of a true and devoted father. None but those who sincerely cherish and revere the name of father realize the meaning of the "vacant chair" which the angel of death has caused by claiming the loved one of whom it can truly be said he entertained loyal and charitable feelings toward his fellow-men, and in death there was that look upon his face which clearly portrayed the "peace which passeth all understanding," and that he was at rest with his Savior. He had for many years been a consistent and respected member of the Independent Order of Old Fellows, whom he requested, a short time ere his death, to officiate at his funeral, which they did with touching ceremony, aided by Rev. Chapin of the M. E. church. A large concourse of friends followed his remains to their last resting place, on Thursday, Dec. 8, '92. Words of sympathy and condolence were freely extended to the bereaved family, who so tenderly cared for their father.
