Dear old year, we take our leave of thee not without a feeling skin to sadness: Thou hast dealt with us kindly, lovingly, far beyond our desert, hast kept us from the hands of the destroyer of our earthly hopes, and crowned us with richest blessings every hour.

#### EDITORIAL COMMENT.

The legislature should not fail to return Senator Paddock to the U. S. Senate. The republicans of that body should remember that Senator Paddock has been one of the most ardent workers in the senate and if they fail to do justice to one of the state's greatest men, they must look out for the condemnation that will surely fall upon their heads. He has worked long and earnestly for his party, and devotedly turned his every effort towards the people of the state in order to better their condition, and to leave him out now would be to injure the interests of the state and jeopardise the party. There are hosts of good men in the state who could fill the position, and who have been allied with the party, but Senator Paddock is pre-eminently better qualified than any who have been mentioned to date.

#### The State Journal is having a "Little Homestead" experience this week with its compositors. On Saturday night the boys decided that they had a grievance and went out, leaving the Journal, as they supposed, in the soup, but Mr. Hathaway and two or three of the men who refused to abide by the chapel meeting, got out the Journal in fair shape. It will be another case, where a few hot headed fellows got up a strike and lost their jobs, instead of resorting to arbitration. Every person is in favor of the laboring man, but generally strikes result in just the very thing that the striker doesn't want. Instead of letting well enough alone, a few fellows will provoke a strike, carry out the force with them, and the whole affair winds up with new men taking their

place, when a moderate course would bring about the desired end far better and save much suffering. If the Journal is not paying fair wages it ought to do so, but strikes do more injury than good, for oft-times it takes away men's employment who have others depending on them for a living and cannot afford to lose their situations.

The legislature meets next week, and the people will expect them to do much better than did its predecessor, which was the most extravagant legislature ever known.

Senator Peffer, generally known among his colleagues in Washington, by the euphonious title of "whiskers" has declared that the populists will take no cognizance of either old party, whenever and wherever they can elect a senator of their own stripe, but when they cannot do so, they will do the best they can in making a deal from whatsoever party favorable.

The incoming legislature should pass a law enacting a "bureau of emigration." The state has never been properly advertised and such a bureau would do much towards getting our state a proper recognition in other states.

The Hon W. E. Andrews, State candidate for congress, in this district; has been appointed minister to San Salvador, at a salary of \$3000 per year. THE CHIEF congratulates Mr. Andrews on his appointment, knowing that he is fully qualified to fill the position. NOTE—since the above was out in type, Mr. Andrews had been offered and accepted office of private secretary of Gov. Crouse.

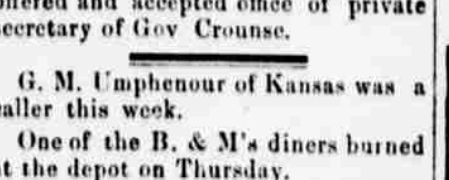
