CITY WATER—There is every indication at the present writing that the city council has at last struck the right lead on the water question, and that in a few days they will have solved that vexed question to the satisfaction of the tax payers. They have been engaged, during the last week, in excavating a large trench at an average depth of sixteen feet, in which they are laying porous tiles leading to the north well near the engine house. They expect, and are, in fact, now in possession of evidence enough to dispell all fear that water in sufficient quantity can be had by the present method. The trench will be from 100 to 300 feet long. This will open into a reservoir of sufficient magnitude to hold hundreds of barrels of water. The reservoir will be fed by numerous laterals laid in various directions, and as the land is apparently underlaid with a sheet of living water, there is no doubt but that the water problem is solved, and that in a few days good water and plenty of it can be had, and that, too, at a cost not to exceed five hundred dollars. The council is to be congratulated for its efforts in this direction.
