Teachers, officers and patrons of the public schools of Webster county, Nebraska.

In order to create a greater interest in education, some educational meetings will be held in the country districts of this county, during this school year.

The first grade class, organized for the purpose of studying algebra and physics during this school year, will hold their meetings on the last Saturday of each month of the school year.

There will not be so many general teacher's meetings held this year as last. At each of these meetings, the Reading Circle work of pupils and teachers, the State course of study, methods of teaching, principles of government, etc., will receive attention.

All teachers are recommended to do the State Reading Circle work for the years '93 and '94. The books selected by the State Reading Circle Board are as follows: The School Master in Literature and

White's Elements of Pedagogy or Shepherd's Historical Readings.

The North Western Journal of Education is the official organ of the State Superintendent, the State Teacher's Association, and the State Reading Circle.

Reading Circle books and N. W. Journal may be obtained through the County Superintendent at reduced rates.

Every teacher is the manager of the Pupil's Reading Circle in his district. The Pupil's Reading Circle work should receive special attention this year; and teachers, patrons and officers should be united in their efforts to cause the reading to be done by the pupils, so as to help the boys and girls to acquire a taste for the reading of good literature.

At the teacher's meeting held at Guide Rock last spring, the County superintendent was appointed conductor of the Pupil's Reading Circle work for this county.

Officers and patrons should visit their schools oftener. Teachers should visit the pupils at their homes frequently. By becoming acquainted with one another's views in regard to school matters, and by trying to do something for the benefit of the schools, teachers, patrons and officers may cause an advancement in the educational work of our county this school year.

The school house should be made the center of attraction in the district. Spelling bees, vocal music lessons, literary exercises, etc., held at the school house on some of the long winter evenings, if properly conducted, are helps in the culture and refinement of the residents of the district.

Let us all work together for the better education and the higher culture of the young people of our neighborhoods, and for the continued advancement of our public schools.
