**AN EARLY MORNING FIRE.**—On Saturday morning, at 5:30, the loud tin-tinulations of the fire alarm announced to the rising Red Cloudians that a fire was in progress. Soon the streets were alive with men fleeing in the direction of the bottoms, where a vast column of dense smoke was ascending heavenward. On going to fourth avenue, it was discovered that one of the barns, known as the Madam Etherton house, was on fire. The fire company hastened to the rescue, but found that they did not have hose enough to reach the building, and by that time the building was enveloped in the fiery elements and could not be saved. This is the second time that this dwelling has been consumed. Some have said that the fire was incendiary, and that a supposed gang of white caps did the work. The fire may have been the work of a fire bug, but **THE CHIEF** wishes to put its seal of condemnation upon arson, or any delivment of that kind, but does not believe that any such institution or society as "white caps" exist in Red Cloud, or ever has been, the little white circular to the contrary. If the building was fired, it was done by some one filled with budge, or some one whose motive was revenge on the inmates, and not by the citizens. Red Cloud citizens are of good repute and do not take the law into their own hands for execution, although, in this case, we believe that such institutions have had too much license in Red Cloud, and that the officers have been directed in the prosecution of the inmates. The furniture in the house was saved.
