CROP PROSPECTS.—There will be a pretty fair crop of corn in Webster county this fall, although there are some farmers who will be quite short of a crop. It seems that while one farmer has a fine crop his neighbor across the road failed, his corn fired, and his loss was general. This freak we cannot account for unless it be the difference between the old style of ploughing and listing corn. This is an important matter for the people to discuss, and if there is any merit in this case we hope those of the farmers interested will take the pains to discuss it through THE CHIEF. If the old style of planting corn is more efficacious than listing it, in dry seasons, then listing ought to be discarded, but if the other is the case then, it ought to be stopped. Then, again, perhaps both plans are all right, and the fault lies in the burning off of the prairie, and stubble in the spring of the year. There may be various causes and the farmers should investigate the matter and find out which is the best for them to do. POLITICS.—The fall political campaign will soon open, and we presume in a most vigorous manner. The Populists have nominated their candidates, and soon the republicans will have done likewise. As to the democrats, we are in the dark, but suppose they will stand aloof and vote as they please, as they seem to be without a political head or narrative to sway them one way or the other. If the republicans put forth their best men there is no reason why they should not elect ever man this year. The Populist candidates are not altogether satisfactory to their own party, and there are many wretched points on which to attack their candidates when the time comes, yet they have nominated a fairly good ticket, but if the republican party hopes to win they must put forth their best and truest men. Set aside all personal feelings this year and go into the battle with a determination to win, not by blackguarding or anything of that kind, but upon good, sound, square politics, and for the best interests of the party and the people, as seen from a republican stand point.
