OUR EDUCATIONAL COLUMN.

Most of the schools of this county open this week. The duty of parents is to send all of their children of school age to school every day. Too many parents are in the habit of framing excuses for not sending their children to school.

Taxes are paid for school purposes, but in many districts the children do not get value received for the money expended by their parents and others for the purpose of supporting the public school. That the children do not get value received for the amount of money expended is not the fault of the public school system, but the fault lies with those parents themselves who neglect to use the means at hand for the education of their children.

The few dollars that John may earn during a three months term of school will never pay for what he loses in mental training by being out of school during those three months. Too many young people desire to commence teaching school just at the time when two or three years of attendance at school is worth more to them than the amount of money that they could earn with their present qualifications in ten years teaching.

Too many boys and girls on account of the eagerness of their parents and of themselves to "make money," leave school before they have acquired all the education that can be obtained in our public schools; after boys and girls have received an education there will be schools to teach, goods to sell, houses to build, fields to plough, horses to shoe, engines to run, and a demand for those who have ability, on account of the mental training received at school, to take the lead in learning to do these things well.

The world is progressing, the men who dig ditches, sprinkle streets, carry hods, deliver goods, plough corn, cut cordwood, pound iron, oil cars, etc, are expected to be better educated now than those who did these same things twenty years ago. When the boys and girls of to day become men and women they will feel the want of education much more than the men and women of to day feel the result of their lost opportunities or their parents' neglect.

It is criminal neglect of the proper care of their children on the part of parents to be careless about giving their children at least a good public school education. Red Cloud has one of the best public schools in the state of Nebraska. One who completes the course in this school has an education that is of inestimable value to him.

The fault of many of our town and city schools is, that, in order that the "machinery" of the school may run smoothly, and mistaken parents be pleased, promotions are made from one grade to another before the pupils are thorough in the work which they are supposed to have done. These promotions are almost forced upon teachers and superintendents often by the foolish clamor of parents to have their children study the "higher" branches before the pupils are thorough in the "common" branches, the most important. Judging from the examination of four of the last year's graduates for certificates to teach, the Red Cloud schools are as free from the above named fault as any school that we know of, and far superior to many. The work of this school promises to be done exceedingly well this year. The teachers will do thorough work in their several grades, and will be under the direction of a city superintendent who has during the past two years, done much to raise the standard of the city schools.

All that is necessary on the part of the parents of Red Cloud is to send their boys and girls to school every day, and to co-operate with the superintendent, and the teachers in the education of their children. As the school board have been careful in the selection of teachers, the superintendent and teachers should have the confidence of the patrons. There are many boys and girls in Red Cloud who have not completed the course, but who do not attend school. The school will go on just the same if these young people do not attend. The teachers' salaries, and other expenses will be paid; the school will cost just the same whether they attend the school or not. All it costs a pupil now in our public schools to get an education in his time and mental application; other necessary things are furnished free. A young man can easily afford to drop a job of work in order to go to school. He can get the same kind of a job to do after he has completed the course at school if he desires it. The good sense of a certain blind man is to be commended. He had a boy leading him. A bystander asked if the boy were his son. The blind man answered, "No Sir, I can not afford to have my boy lead me; I have employed this one to do it. My boy is in school."
