### WEATHER FORECASTS

Furnished Expressly for The Chief for Webster County

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., Sept. 22.— My last bulletin gave forecasts of the storm waves to cross the continent from September 19th to 23d, and 25th to 29th, and the next will reach the Pacific coast about the 30th, cross the western mountains by close of Oct. 1st, the great central valleys from 2d to 4th, and the eastern states about the 5th.

The warm wave will cross the western mountains about September 30th, the great central valleys about October 2d, and the eastern states about the 4th. The cool wave will cross the western mountains about October 3d, the great central valleys about the 5th, and the eastern states about the 7th.

From October 1st to 9th will average warmer than usual; from 10th to 20th cooler than usual, and from 21st to 31st, warmer than usual.

### SUN HURRICANES.

It is probable that we see on the sun only the spots caused by sun hurricanes. This is indicated by the positions occupied by the spots, most of which are seen between 10 and 30 degrees of north and south latitudes, or within two narrow strips, only about 20 degrees in width, extending around the sun north and south of its equator, leaving another central strip at the equator about 20 degrees wide within which spots are seldom seen.

Hurricanes have their homes on the large oceans on the earth, and by analogy we are led to believe that such is the condition on the sun. We have three great oceans on the earth, on which, north of the equator, are found the great hurricane fields, and these fields are located on the earth in positions similar to the positions on the sun where the great sun spots are observed.

We have what are known as the West India hurricanes which move along the earth's equator in a westerly direction till they reach the Windward islands where they turn to the north west and enter the West India islands, and then pass to the north and the east. These have great force only when near the West Indies.

In the Pacific ocean south of China is another favorite field of the destructive hurricanes and we often hear of them about the Philippine islands. The third hurricane field is found in the Indian ocean, and great damage results to India from that class of storms.

In each of these fields the hurricanes move in an irregular semi-circle, and if we compare paths of these earth hurricanes with the paths of the sun spots, we find a wonderful similarity in their movements.

The force and number of our hurricanes and other storms increase and decrease in proportion to the number and size of sun spots, and the increase and decrease of magnetic influences and auroras on the earth is in accord with the increase and

decrease of sun spots. These are facts accepted by all scientists.

Dr. Veeder and others claim that the sun spots cause the magnetic storms and auroras on the earth. I contend that when the planets occupy disturbing positions, the magnetic disturbance caused thereby becomes the common cause of sun spots, earth storms, auroras, etc.

But when it comes to prove the correctness of this theory it is no easy task. Jupiter has long been regarded as the ruling cause of sun spots, but the periods do not agree. Jupiter's revolution around the sun requires 11 86 years, and the average sun spot maxima occur 11.1 years apart. This would bring the sun spot period sometimes when Jupiter is nearest the sun, and sometimes when he is farthest away. Our great astronomers have pointed out these discrepancies and concluded that Jupiter has nothing to do with the spots on the sun. Prof. Young, whose books are extensively used in our great institutions of learning, says: "There is very little reason for supposing that Jupiter has any considerable influence on sun spots."

Time was when our great scientists were accepted as oracles, but that time no longer is. Their word is no longer the law. Instead of being law, a question mark follows every assertion they make.

To illustrate: Years of work were bestowed by eminent scientists investigating the influence of the moon on our weather, and after a long series of records comparing the moon's first quarter, full moon, third quarter, etc., with the weather, it was gravely announced that the moon has no appreciable influence on the weather. From the mystic traditions of the dark ages, where was born the legends of a false astrology, has come to our time a belief that the changes of the moon bring changes of the weather. An idea with no underlying truth, and this the great scientists have investigated, and because no truth was found in that tradition, the real influences of the moon have been discarded, or rather have not, by them, been investigated. So it is as to Jupiter and the sun spots.

### OUR EDUCATIONAL COLUMN.

The first educational meeting of this year in this county was held at the school house in Dist. No. 4 south of Guide Rock on last Thursday evening September 14th.

The meeting was well attended and quite an interest was manifested in the cause of education.

The questions of the query box were discussed by those present. The discussion of this question brought out a few different opinions, in regard to various subjects. If the remainder of the educational meetings during the year was as well attended and interesting as this one was, they will prove a success. The next one will be held at the school house in Dist. No. 3 south of Inavale, on Thursday evening of this week Sep 21. A large attendance is expected at the Cowles teachers meeting next Saturday Sep. 23d.

The following districts were visited by the Co. Superintendent previous to Sep 15th, and the number enrolled, the number present on the day of the visit, and the enumeration of the school children of each district according to census of June 1893 are as follows:

At the south school in district No. 78 there is a larger enrollment this term than during any other term for several years.

District No. 72 and 4 take the lead in the per cent, of the enumeration enrolled.

In some of the districts not one half of the number enumerated are enrolled in the schools. Of course there are a few of school age in nearly every district, either married or employed on the farm or in the kitchen by the week or month, but it is evident that there should be a greater number enrolled in some schools.
