As many questions have been asked concerning the new law in regard to sending children to the nearest school, we think best to publish it in this column this week. It is as follows:

"An act to allow children of school age of their home district to attend school at a nearer district.

Be it enacted by the legislature of the state of Nebraska:

Section 1. That where children of school age are living over one and one half miles from the school house where they reside, and shall reside a half mile or more nearer to another school house, they may attend at the school house nearest to their place of residence.

The school district where such chil dren shall attend school may collect from the school district where they shall reside, the share of the state apportionment to which such children are entitled, which shall be collectible as the county Superintendent shall make public the said apportionment.

Section 2. The teacher shall keep correct record of the above pupils, showing their place of residence."
