As Seen by an Eye Witness. M. L. D. Oatmat, who has just returned from the Cherokee atrip, told our reporter some interesting facts concerning that country, its resources, &c. On the Sh of September he in company with Sammy Spry, started for the opening of the strip, and having two horses besides the team which he drove, and being bitched to a light rig, they took their time, knowing they would have no difficulty in reaching the strip in time to make the race for land.
