WEATHER FORECASTS

Furnished Expressly for The Chief for Webster County

St. JOSEPH, Mo., October 3rd.—My last bulletin gave forecasts of the storm waves to cross the continent from 5th to 6th, and the next will reach the Pacific coast about the 10th, cross the western mountains by close of the 11th, the great central 12 h to 14 h, and the eastern states about the 15th.

The warm wave will cross the western mountains about the 10th, the great central valleys about the 12th, and the eastern states about the 14th. The cool wave will cross the western mountains about the 13th, the great central valleys about the 15th, and the eastern states about the 17th.

Very severe storms may be expected to cross the continent from November 16th to December 9th.

It is surprising to see how many readers confuse my forecasts with those of the national weather bureau. I have nothing to do with any thing dated at Washington, and cannot afford to be held responsible for anything more than my own errors. Give us planetary meteorologists fair critics, and we are always ready to compare our long range forecasts of the national weather bureau notwithstanding their government aid of over \$2,000 a day.

Too many readers overlook the conditions under which my forecasts are made. All should remember that the weather changes are expected within 24 hours of sunset of the day named, and therefore not necessarily on that day.

"CURRENT THEORIES OF STORMS."

Prof. Bigelow of the national weather bureau, says: "That the meteorological system is somewhat dependent upon the coronal magnetic field hardly admits of further doubt, and consequently there is grounds for the modification of the current theory of storms."

That is the first time anybody connected with the national weather bureau has admitted a possibility that planetary meteorologists have the correct theory as to weather changes, and now it is stated in the public press that his investigations are to be discontinued by the department of agriculture.

In another paragraph Prof. Bigelow says: 'Storms tend to accumulate, and severe weather is most frequent after the 3rd, 11th, 17th, 22nd and 26th. Herein is an admirable source of long range weather predictions in general terms.' This quotation is somewhat remarkable, coming from its high and responsible authority. Starting with what he calls the 3rd day and counting to the 26th is 23 days, and counting the first as one, this 23 days exactly covers five of my storm waves, not widely differing from the five disturbances mentioned by him.

But Prof. Bigelow will not be permitted to follow up this work, for with a long range system of forecasts perfected, the dealers in cereal options would have no great advantage over the agriculturists, and the former are so powerful no position is secure when they desire to get an objectionable person out of what they consider their field of operations.

The facts as to magnetic influences of the sun on our earth were not obtained by Prof. Bigelow by examining the sun, but from the record of magnetic action at various places all around and on the earth, therefore it is only a theory with him as to the sun being the sole cause of those magnetic disturbances. I believe him to be in error as to some portions of his theory on which he has no proof. His idea is that there are places on the sun that send out great magnetic disturbances, and that these envelope the earth at intervals, because of the rotation of the sun on its axis. Prof. Tee held that a new, or undiscovered, planet called Vulcan is the cause of these magnetic disturbances. When the truth is known, all the places will be found to have something to do in causing these magnetic throbs, or heart-beats of the solar system.

The difference between the investigation made by Prof. Bigelow and those made by planetary meteorologists is, that he has taken the recorded changes in magnetism, and found that this force comes to the earth in periodic waves, while we have taken the weather records for many years, and found that great weather disturbances

have come and continue to occur coincident with certain positions of the sun moon and planets, these positions being such as, according to the laws of magnetism, would cause magnetic and weather disturbances on the earth. We have also found that sun spots, magnetic storms, great weather events and the magnetic disturbing positions of sun, moon and planets are coincident. Therefore we hold that it is the planetary positions that cause all these disturbances through magnetic or electro-magnetic influences.

Prof. Veeder, of Lyons, New York, has recorded the auroral displays, and has demonstrated that they are coincident with the sun spots. Prof. Bigelow finds that the sun spots, or the rotation of the sun, coincides with the magnetic throbs on the earth, and planetary meteorologists have demonstrated that whether changes are coincident with sun spots, aurora, and certain positions of the sun, moon and planets relative to each other.

Out of these facts is being evolved the new meteorology. The subject is one of many and great difficulties, but that which is easily obtained is of but little value.

The progress now being made on this and many other questions of great importance is greatly indebted to the newspapers and very little to orthodox scientists. Independent, liberty-loving thinkers, reach the people through the daily and weekly press, and public opinion soon forces the orthodox scientists out of their old ruts.

As never before, the world is honey-combed with new thought, and the old is being turned down. Not only in scientific matters is this true, but in all that relates to man. Why this wonderful bound, this swift-flying new thought as if on the wings of a Mercury?

This age of electricity and of electric thought, may be the result of a great magnetic equinox, which if the unknown of the universe is patterned after the known, must occur at intervals of about 13,000 years, when our solar system passes its equinox with the great center around which it moves in about 26,000 years.

During the last two weeks the editor of this column has been visiting schools and holding educational meetings, and has not taken time to prepare anything for the educational column.

Week before last after visiting seven schools in the northeastern part of the county, an educational meeting was held at the Ranney school-house in Dist. No. 77 on Thursday evening Oct 19th. The meeting was well attended especially by young people. Some subjects were quite well discussed, and all present seemed to be interested in the cause of education. Some of the questions presented by those present which received attention at the meeting are as follows: How can a boy go to school in the summer? How can we interest the parents sufficiently to arrange their work to suit the schools? Why does a girl always want to have her lessons, while a boy does not care whether he has his or not? Why is it that the parents give the girls better schooling than the boys? Should scholars enter college, when they may yet learn more in the district school?

What are the best exercises for the scholars, while the older ones are reciting? Explain the infinitive phrase. The educational meeting in district No. 20, southwest of Bladen on Thursday evening October 26, was attended by some of the patrons of the district and others.

Some of the questions discussed at this meeting were:

Is it advisable to allow a pupil to study in a book too difficult for him? How would you punish pupils that fight?

How would you punish pupils that damage school property?

These meetings we think will be helpful in creating an interest in school work.

The first grade class met at Red Cloud High school room last Saturday. Only four members of the class
