WEATHER FORECASTS

Furnished Expressly for The Chief for Webster County

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., Dec. 15.—My last bulletin gave forecasts of the storm wave to cross the continent from December 15th, to 19th, and the next will reach the Pacific coast about the 20th, cross the western mountains by close of 21st, the great central valleys from 22d, to 24th, and the eastern states about the 25th.
The disturbing influences at date of this storm wave will be favorable to earthquake countries. About December 22d the earth will receive a large amount of electrical force and this may result in severe earthquakes or the force may pass to the earth through the high barometers, in which case we will have a severe cold wave.
Th's overcharge of electricity will pass from the earth again about the 29th and January 5th and we will experience severe storms about these dates.
The last storm wave of December will reach the Pacific coast about the 26th, cross the western mountains by close of the 27th, the great central valleys from the 28th 30th and the eastern states about the 31st. This will be a very severe winter storm in the Mississippi valley about the 29th.
Warm waves will cross the western mountains about 20th and 26th, the great central valleys about 22d 28th

and the eastern states about the 24th, and 30th.

Cool waves will cross the western mountains about 23rd and 29th, the great central valleys about 25th and 31st, and the eastern states about 27th and January 2d.

THE PLANET JUPITER.

In our solar system Jupiter is next in importance to the sun, and among the causes of weather changes is third the moon being second. When at perihelion—in the same direction from the sun that the earth is about October 3rd—it is about 21,000,000 miles nearer the sun than when in the opposite part of its orbit.

For the above reason when Jupiter is near perihelion its influence on the earth is largely increased and to that fact is due many of our serious drouths from July to December.

The sun and planets are unquestionably great natural magnets, electrified bodies, and their changing distances from each other certainly keep up a constant changing to their electrical conditions. Volatile matter—water, etc.—readily evaporates when the amount of the electricity is increased and readily condenses and precipitates when electricity is withdrawn and as Jupiter comes 21,000,000 miles nearer to the sun and earth in a little less than six years and recedes the same distance from the earth and sun during the same length of time next following it is a powerful factor in bringing excessive rains and excessive drouths.

I invite a study of Jupiter, not so much because of its astronomical interest as because of its great influence upon the weather of our earth; from it we can learn much about the nature of our own atmosphere and climatic changes. The average distance of Jupiter from the sun is about 481,000,000 miles, or about three times the distance of the earth from the sun. It makes a revolution around the sun in 11 86 years and the earth passes between it and the sun every 399 days. Jupiter's diameter is about eleven times, its surface about 119 times and its volume 1,300 times that of the earth. Its weight, or what its weight would be at the surface of our earth, is reckoned 319 times that of the earth.

The great distance of Jupiter from the earth largely decreases its influence, its pull, as astronomers call it, on the earth, and I only mention this here in order to caution readers against the idea that the planets affect our weather through their attraction of gravitation, or their pull on our atmosphere. It is the magnetic or electric stream lines that go out from all these bodies and therefore distance, or distances as we have in the solar system, have but little effect as compared with gravitational distances. I will discuss the nature of planetary influences upon our weather further on.

The astronomers all try to prove that Jupiter is a boiling, red-hot body. Nonsense. They see unaccountable activity in the clouds of that planet—nothing of the planet can be seen but its clouds—and they conclude that as sufficient heat cannot reach the planet from the sun to cause such activity, therefore the heat must come from within the planet. If they would explain how heat could reach the earth from the sun when all space between the two is ten thousand times colder than ice, common mortals might think of accepting their theories about Jupiter.
