Phenomena of Light. Written For THE CHIEF.

Intimately connected with the theory of heat as presented in my former article is the phenomena of light.

We look up and around us and see a vast canopy spread over and around apparently only a little way from us and meeting the earth in the horizon. If we travel toward the point where we supposed this canopy meets this visible horizon, we find that as we advance it recedes, and if we make the entire circuit of the globe, at every point the same blue canopy is spread over and around us. So if we could from our particular station on the earth ascend in a line toward our zenith, this same canopy would recede from us and the beautiful "blue sky" would disappear, and looking back toward earth we see it enveloped in a dazzling white light like Venus or Jupiter. It would be out of place for me to tell you why the "sky" is blue in this article. I only refer to it in order to show that light depends on atmosphere. In other words, no atmosphere, no light. There is no luminosity in the ray of light and heat until it comes in contact with an atmosphere containing oxygen. It is extremely doubtful of there being oxygen in the sun's atmosphere. The red lines in the solar spectrum are due to absorption as the rays pass through the earth's atmosphere. The conclusion is that the lines and bands of the spectrum are due to oxygen results exclusively from the earth's atmosphere. It will now be conceded that the sun, stars, and planets have an atmosphere similar in composition except that of the sun's which contains no oxygen, but contains all the other elements necessary to produce light held in abeyance while being projected through space upon the atmosphere of the planets and earth.

It will also be conceded that each have a similar brilliancy and proportionate to their magnitude distance. Will any one contend that Venus whose brightness almost equals that of the sun's, only that it is smaller, is an intensely heated body. That it is its flames that gives it its brilliant appearance? So with Mars, Jupiter Saturn and fixed stars? Is the entire universe of God on fire? Is this earth the only exception? Has the brilliancy of Jupiter, or Venus, or the red lines of Mars increased or diminished since the sun first shone on Gibson, or the moon in the valley of Agelon? Every advance of science, every new discovery, founded on nature's law adds proof of the wisdom, perfection, and simplicity pervading throughout the entire universe.

It will make no difference whether our deductions and conclusions are true or false. The plans of eternal wisdom will not be altered. Fortunately it has been settled beyond a doubt that there is no oxygen in the sun's atmosphere. I gave an outline describing the formation of heat. These same (lines) rays composed of electricity projected into earth's atmosphere became ignited infinitesimally through atmospheric space before focusing and illuminating our entire atmosphere. The ultimate of the reasoning is—that in the absence of an atmosphere there can be no light. The moon has no atmosphere consequently no light, only by reflection, otherwise with an atmosphere it would shine with a brilliant light.—J. W. EUBERT.

Supervisors' Proceedings.

Board convened at 9 a. m., January 25, fifteen members present, A. H. Hoffman chairman, presiding.

On motion bridge committee was authorized to advertise for bids for the building of all bridges during the year 1894 by lineal foot, builders to furnish materials, bridges to be built upon specifications furnished by bridge committee.

Same committee was also authorized to replank Red Cloud bridge when same becomes necessary.

Mr. Kaley was authorized to take care of and provide suitable clothing for Tena Hansen.

Bridge committee was instructed to examine Red Cloud bridge at once and report upon its condition.

Committee to settle with county clerk reported that they had done so and found books and accounts correct. Adopted.

Committee on poor house were authorized to contract for breaking on poor farm at \$1.75 per acre.

Ways and means committee was instructed to levy a tax sufficient to raise \$1,500 for the purpose of building a house and other necessary buildings on poor farm. Also to make an estimate for \$20,000 for a general road fund.

Damages having been waived a road was ordered platted between sections ten and eleven, nine and four.

Committee to settle with the county treasurer find the report made by him to be true and correct.

Ways and means committee submitted the following estimate of expenses for the year 1894:

Report adopted. The appointment of W. R. Parker as deputy county clerk was confirmed, and his salary fixed at \$700. The clerks request for extra clerk hire during the year, as needed, was also granted.

In the matter of the petition of Chas. Hunter and others for a road south from Inavale to the bridge, the same was granted, the road ordered opened and the clerk instructed to plat same.

Claim of W. N. Richardson for \$150 was granted and warrant ordered in payment. Mr. Sawyer waived all damages.

Bridge committee reported that they had examined the Red Cloud bridge and found the floor of same in a dangerous condition and recommended that bridge be condemned by the board until there are funds on hand to pay for repairs. The report was adopted and the bridge condemned.

The special committee to view the bridge recommended that the floor be taken up in the panels where joint are broken and new joint put in. Report adopted and the bridge committee instructed to make the necessary repairs as soon as possible.

Ways and means committee reported recommending the approval of the bonds of the following banks as county depositories: First National bank of Blue Hill, Bank of Guide Rock, Blue Hill Bank, People's Bank of Red Cloud, State Bank of Blue Hill. The report of the committee was adopted and the bonds of the several banks approved, except that of the last named bank.

The bond of the State Bank of Red Cloud heretofore approved was continued and accepted by the board.

The clerk was instructed to notify the treasurer that the bonds and bids of the several banks as above noted, had been approved and accepted by the board, and the same designated as legal depositories. Also that he withdraw funds now on deposit from the bank whose bond failed of acceptance.
