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From Missouri.

POLK, POLK Co., Mo. TO THE CHIEF:—I should have written to THE CHIEF long ago, but I have had so much writing and so much work to do, it seemed I never could find time, but I enjoy reading the letters of old acquaintances in other states, and also the correspondents' letters from places where I am acquainted, and perhaps some of THE CHIEF's family, of which I am a member, would like to hear from me and this part of Missouri. Brothers Chaney and Calmes seem to like Howell county; some of your family like California and some do not; some are in Oregon, and some in Utah; some in nearly every state; verily, the irrepressible Webster county man is present everywhere. His foot on every mountain pass, On every stream his sail. THE CHIEF is always ready to print interesting letters from its friends and I regard this as a great feature in a newspaper, and a privilege we should appreciate. How pleasant to be able to exchange ideas and information through the kindness of a paper. Well, like Howell county, we have stumps and stones, lots of poor soil, bad roads, etc., horses must be shod, and railroads are not very plenty. (Boliver has a stub railroad and the Memphis runs through the west side of the county) but we have many advantages. The last two summers and winters have been the driest for many years, and also the poorest crop years, especially for fruit; but everybody seems to have plenty. We do not raise as much as you do in years like '89, but in years like '90 we discount you and get more for it. Though Polk Co. is no larger than Webster, it has 25,000 people, and is still ready to welcome intelligent people from the north, who have a little money and wish to buy a cheap home. Our improved lands are perhaps a little higher than yours, but our unimproved lands are lower. We have school-houses and churches in abundance. I think this a healthier country than Nebraska, especially for throat diseases; very little diphtheria here. We have an abundance of fuel, and taxes are low. My tax on 265 acres of land was \$11.50, and over 100 acres of it is rich creek bottom; building material very cheap; No. 1 oak lumber \$10 to \$12 per 1000. I think nearly all goods are cheaper here than with you. Polk county was organized in the '30's, and the present court-house was built in '41. Bolivar, the county seat, is about the size of Red Cloud, but more business houses, good schools, a college, fine opera house, churches, milling, etc., abundance of spring water. Bolivia only has two papers; people here read the Bible more than they do papers; if you want to see religion in its primitive form come here. I have not met a native here who is an infidel or skeptic, but such tobacco users I never saw before, and I now realize what a filthy habit it is. And they drink some liquor too, but "yum yum" is the pure quill and don't craze a man, but they have some foggy notions. For instance I have had two big debates this winter on the question, whether the earth is flat and stationary, and was opposed the last time by two preachers, but all was in vain. The indebtedness of the country is not as heavy as there. Horses are cheap, and grains are about the same here as there.—S. I. UMPIERNOU.
