WEATHER FORECASTS

Furnished Expressly for The Chief for Webster County (Copyrighted by W. T. Foster.)
ST. JOSEPH, MO, March 2.—My last bulletin gave forecasts of the storm waves to cross the continent from March 7th to 11th and the next will reach the Pacific coast about the 11th, cross the western mountains by close of March 12th, the great central valleys from 13th to 15th, and the eastern states about the 11th.
This will be a dangerous storm, and will probably develop tornadoes. The aurora will make an unusual display, and telegraphic lines will have difficulty with an electric storm.
The warm wave preceding the storm will be unusually warm, and following it a drop in temperature from 10 to 40 degrees may be expected.
The warm wave will cross the western mountains about the 11th, the great central valleys about 13th, and the eastern states about 14th. The cool wave will cross the western mountains about the 14th, the great central valleys about the 16th and the eastern states about the 18th.
The heavy rains of this storm will not be extensive but concentrated. Rains will be more general the first and last ten days of the month than during the intermediate ten days.

PERIODICAL BAROMETERS.
High barometers are caused by descending currents of electricity and low barometers by ascending currents. These currents move toward the sun, moon and planets and therefore the periodical lows change from north to south.

When the sun comes north in summer the periodical low comes with it and covers the continent. The lowest of this summer depression covers the country surrounding the south of Salt Lake. Another low point covers the country about and northeast of Labrador and Newfoundland. A third low spot covers our northwestern coast while the north Atlantic permanent high makes inroads on our southeastern coast.

This summer low gives way to a winter high and on one square mile of surface near its center the atmosphere weighs 256,000,900 pounds more in winter than in summer. This is clearly the measure of the difference in the sun's summer and winter effects on the atmosphere of our continent.

Each low barometer induces a high which is its mate. The two increase and decrease together and the mate of our summer periodical low is found in the periodical high which, at the same time, covers the South American continent.
The change occurs about the first of April and October. About the former

date the periodical low, which has hung over South America for six months, comes north of the earth's equator, taking the place of our six months high, and the latter goes to South America to replace its low. About the first of October our low goes to South America, and their high comes to our continent. About the time of the October change the great hurricanes north of the equator and about the April change the hurricanes are more severe south of the equator.

While the high covers our continent in winter its center covers Kansas, Colorado, Utah and the country lying north, including Manitoba, and the prevailing winds blow around that center from left to right, or with the hands of the watch when the latter is placed with the face up.
The tendency of the transient lows and highs is to move around the north side of this periodical winter high. The east line of the central portions of this high extends through the center of Manitoba and down the Missouri river causing the prevailing winds to blow from the northwest and therefore this line extended into Texas is the central line of the coldest cold waves.

St. Vincent, Minnesota, is on the line, and except the mountain peaks, is the coldest place in the United States. Its January average temperature is seven degrees below zero. Its elevation is 804 feet above sea level. Assinipon is twelve degrees west of St. Vincent, about the same latitude with an elevation 1886 feet greater than the latter. But the January temperature of the former averages seventeen degrees warmer than the latter. This illustrates the influence of our periodical high barometer in winter. In the high mountain country on its west the weather is very much warmer than in the valleys on its eastern borders. On its west the winds come from the south and after having moved far toward the polar regions, where they are cooled they return through Manitoba, Minnesota, etc., bringing with them the Arctic weather.

The lows, or storm centers, coming from the Pacific, pass through or around this periodical high. When the energies of our planetary system are aroused, that winter or periodical high increases in force and the storms are whirled around its northern borders taking a northern route through Canada and leaving warm pleasant weather in the United States. Another class of magnetic disturbances pull the transient lows and highs, or the storm waves, far southward, and then we get the cold wave and the blizzard.

This winter high causes southeast winds of prevail in the southwestern states and the north Atlantic high has the same effect in summer so that in the country west of the lower Mississippi the prevailing winds are from the southeast, a condition not experienced on any other part of this continent.

From the above discussion it will be noted that in the great northwest during six months, the winter season, the pure air from space comes down and from there spreads out over the balage of the continent, while in summer the sea breezes come from the gulf of Mexico and the Pacific ocean raising into space over the great mountain region of the west.

The northeastern states and eastern Canada are constantly under the influence of the Icelandic low barometer, the southeastern states under the north Atlantic high while the great west alternates between the periodic high in winter and low in summer.

The meteorologist must keep these conditions constantly in view and in them the biologist may find cause for determining what these three new races of man will be under these three climatic conditions in the age to come.

Causes of Recent Depression.

In period of depression men look for a cause, and are very likely to jump at a conclusion. The cause of the present depression in business—now long continued—was at first said to be the purchasing of silver by the government: so the purchasing clause of the act of 1891, commonly called the Sherman act, was repealed. Then the financial panic—or semi panic—was said to be the cause. That soon passed. Then the trouble was attributed to the scarcity of money. Now there is a plethora of money. Later the cause was said to be the expected new tariff bill. This bill has been before the public for weeks, and the worst is known. These so called "causes" have all disappeared, but their disappearance has not put a wheel in motion nor a hand to work. It is not, perhaps, within scope of the greatest intelligence to account satisfactorily for the present state of affairs. It is world-wide. Its beginning may be traced to the time, three years ago, marked by the failure of the Barings. Next came the crisis in Argentine affairs. Then, shortly, the panic in Australia; and later this wave of depression over the United States, which does not yet recede, although the supposed causes have been eliminated.—From "Home Industries and the Wilson Bill," by President Edward Kemble of the Boston Chamber of Commerce, in North American Review for March.
