From all probabilities there will be twenty five acres of onions planted in picnic garden and vicinity this year, the average yield of onions for 1893 in this vicinity was about 400 bu. to the acre. The varieties raised were red weatherfields red globe yellow Denver Early reds silver skins and several other varieties of less consequences, the early reds red globe and red weatherfields prove to be the best. Onion ground is in the best possible condition at present and a good crop is looked for in 1894. Mr. G. A. Latta and W. V. Beal are the principal onion men. Onion ground should be planted the first of March in rows 4 inches apart. It is the best for the ground to be fertilized and plowed the fall before planting, the ground should be smooth and not weeded. It takes from 2 1/2 to 4 pounds of seed to the acre, the onion ground should be kept clean of weeds from the time of planting until the onions have matured keep the ground well watered.

Most of the inhabitants of this vicinity attended the oyster supper at Pleasant Hill last Saturday evening, there was no lack of music and every one got to hear the different tones of the new organ, with all the different variations of old and new pieces, the sweetest tones of the violin intermingled with the rich tones of the organ.
