Death of Charley Boynton.

[The following article which relates to the death of Charley Boynton, is published at this late date by request, as the young man has many friends here who desire to know fully how he met his death.—Eds.]

Charles Boynton, a well known and popular fireman in the employ of the Illinois Central, met death in a shocking manner shortly after noon yesterday.

About the noon hour an extra freight train, in charge of Conductor J. B. Cornelius and Engineer Robert Petrie pulled out of the Freeport yards bound for Dubuque. Charles Boynton started on the trip as Petrie's fireman. His wife and child accompanied him to the round house, and stood on the crossing waving their hands as the train pulled out of the yards. The next time the poor wife gazed upon her husband's form it was in death. The engine which pulled the train was No. 448, one of the new Rogers' moguls which had just been sent out from the shop, and it was the engineer's first trip west. Engineer Petrie, one of the most careful engineers in the employ of the company, was very proud of his new engine and so was his fireman. As the train approached Preston's bridge the fireman leaned out of the gangway to get a good view of the engine in motion. He was so delighted with the movement of the ponderous wheels that he forgot all about the bridge. As the engine shot across the bridge the fireman's head came in contact with the side of the bridge and he was knocked from the engine. Head brakeman F. C. Lee was riding in the engine at the time and he saw Boynton fall, and at once informed the engineer who quickly stopped the train. The trainman went to the assistance of their wounded companion and carried him back to the caboose. He was alive when picked up but unconscious. The train was at once backed to Freeport, but Boynton died before the city was reached. Coroner Deitrich was informed of the accident and at once held an inquest in the caboose where the unfortunate young man had died.

The first witness to testify was head brakeman, C. F. Lee. He said that he was riding in the engine at the time of the accident and was looking out of the cab window as the train was approaching the bridge across Preston's creek. At that time Fireman Boynton was leaning out to the gangway, holding onto the railing with both hands. The bridge struck the fireman and he was thrown from the engine, his body striking one of the rods of the bridge and then fell down on the ties. Lee immediately informed the engineer, who stopped the engine. They ran back to Boynton and found him lying just as he had fell, gasping for breath. They took him off the track, then backed up to the caboose, placed the wounded man on board and backed the train to Freeport.

J. B. Cornelius, the conductor of the train, said that the first he knew of the accident was when Breakman Lee came running back to the caboose and reported that the fireman had been killed on the bridge. He assisted in carrying him to the caboose. Boynton was still alive, but died at 1:05 before the train reached Freeport.

Engineer Petrie testified that he knew nothing of the accident until Lee hailed to him that the fireman had been killed. He stopped the train and backed up to the body and helped place it in the caboose. Mr. Petrie further testified that Mr. Boynton had been his fireman for a period of about two years. He thought the bridge was a standard bridge and thought the engine was wider than others. It was a new engine and it was the first time either himself or his fireman had been in it. The engine was a little over nine feet wide, while the ordinary Hickley freight is eight feet and eight and one-half inches.

Kirk Walters, the hind brakeman, corroborated the statements made by the other trainmen.

Dr. Buckley, who had examined the injuries of Boynton, testified that he found a fracture of the lower jaw and right cheek bone and extensive fractures of the frontal bone; also a lacerated wound of the right elbow.

After listening to the above testimony the jury returned a verdict to the effect that Charles Boynton came to his death by being accidentally hit on the head by a bridge over Preston's creek, thereby causing severe fractures of the frontal bone, and

other fatal injuries.

The jury was composed of Henry B. Witte, foreman; Henry J. Keller, George H. Lubbers, Frank B. Koenig, H. B. Price and Frank Rogers.

After the inquest the body of Boynton was taken to his home near the gas works. His family consists of his wife and two children. He was the son of B. F. Boynton of Rock Falls, one of the oldest passenger conductors in the employ of the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy. The boy was born at Grass Lake, Michigan, September, 1862. He was formerly in the employ of the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy, and went to work for the Illinois Central about two years ago. His fellow employes have nothing but words of praise for the young man. He was steady and reliable, and his death has brought sorrow to many hearts. The young man's father resided Freeport this morning, and will accompany the body to Grass Lake this evening where it will be interred.

Cotton Factory Experiments.

A system of moistening the air of a cotton factory—as is required in some departments of a mill before blowing it into the rooms—has been the subject of much experiment. It has been found that, if a jet of steam or vapor is discharged into the main duct any degree of humidity desired can be obtained, but all the air is moistened alike, being distributed to the different rooms by the risers leading thereto. That, however, which is best adapted for one department in a cotton mill may not prove equally favorable for another.

Then, too, the introduction of moisture at this point may work disastrously to the walls of the ducts and risers. It is now found that this objection may be overcome at a small expense, by carrying a steam pipe down through each room and putting opposite each opening in the flue, through which the air enters the room, an outlet with valves for regulating the flow of the steam. In this way the exhaust steam from the engine which drives the blower flows into the room, and being caught up by the current of air passing from the flue is thus distributed throughout the room. Experience with this plan through cold weather has proved its peculiar value.—New York Sun.

Dentists' Secrets.

A long chapter of dentists' secrets—the secrets revealed to them by customers made unconscious but talkative by gas—has been revealed by a conscienceless tooth puller up in Pittsburg. One society young lady swore several lines of blank spaces while a tooth was being drawn. Princess Hohenlohe, the wife of the governor general of Alsace-Lorraine, inherited from her uncle, a Russian general, estates in Russia worth 80,000,000 or 40,000,000 rubles.
