### The State Fair.

The management of the Nebraska state board of agriculture is arranging for an extraordinary fair and exposition at Lincoln in September next. While the association was organized almost exclusively as an agricultural developing medium, and at first, and for many years following, acted and worked in that line, principally because our own people, as a rule, regarded the state as peculiarly and almost exclusively agricultural in its characteristics, of late years there has been most gratifying tendencies in the direction of manufacturing industries. As a result there has been organized a state manufacturers and consumers' association. Last year a large portion of agricultural hall on the state fair grounds was given this association for its annual exhibit, at the same time, on the same grounds, and in connection with the state fair, as a part of the great state exposition. And with most agreeable and satisfactory results. This year the manufacturers association is to occupy all of the large hall on the fair grounds erected for and known as merchants hall. This will insure a grand exhibit of both the agricultural and manufacturing resources of the state.

In asking bids for the relocation of the state fair and exposition for the coming five years one of the prominent specifications will be for a manufacturers hall of sufficient capacity to accommodate the growing demands of Nebraska manufacturing factors.

The art demands of the state are of such rapid growth that more space is required for this department and will be furnished in due time

The superintendent of agricultural and horticultural halls are already importing the management for more space. Also the poultry, honey and fish departments.

Columbian year seems to have stimulated to fair work all over the state. County organizations are early in the field and already actively at work for the coming fall campaign. All in all the outlook for fairs in 1894 is most promising, and the climax will come in the final state grand round up on the days of September 7 to 14 next.

### The Mexican Pension Roll.

On the Mexican pension roll there are the names of 15,214 survivors and 7,282 widows, and something over 3,000 cases were pending at latest reports. This makes a total of 25,497 or several thousand more men than the United States had in Mexico at any one time during the war. These all receive either \$8 or \$12 a month.

Among the names are those of the widow of Gen. Samuel Cooper, a New Yorker by birth, who was Adjutant-General of the United States Army at the outbreak of the war, and used his position to aid the rebels in preparing for the struggle. He resigned his position to become Adjutant-General of the Southern Confederacy, and officiated as such until the rebellion collapsed. Mrs Cooper has been drawing a pension since June 6, 1887.

The widow of Thomas J. ("Stonewall") Jackson, who was next to Lee the most popular commander of the rebel armies.

The widow of Maj.-Gen. George E. Pickett, who commanded a division in the rebel army.

The widow of Maj.-Gen. Gideon J. Pillow, who commanded a division in the rebel army.

The widow of Lieut.-Gen. A. P. Hill who commanded one of the three corps of Lee's army.

The widow of Sidney Smith Lee, who was dismissed from the navy for "going over to the enemy," and afterward became a Commodore in the rebel navy.

Brig.-Gen. Jas. R. Chalmers, who was Forrest's chief lieutenant.

Maj.-Gen. Dabney H. Maury, who commanded the rebel troops at the battle of Chickasaw Bayou.

Hon. S. B. Maxey, late United States senator from Texas, who has been drawing his pension since May 27, 1887. He was a Maj.-Gen. in the rebel army.

Hon. Jas. Z. George, senator from Mississippi, and who served in the rebel army as a Colonel. The number of his certificate is 17,214.

Hon. A. H. Colquitt, senator from Georgia, who was a Maj.-General in the rebel army, draws a pension under certificate 19,199.

The widows above mentioned are of men who were educated at the Government expense, and afterward fought to destroy the Government. They went on the roll at once, while last April there were pending the claims of 145,520 widows of Union soldiers who had not been able to get on the roll.

### Here It Is Again; The Smallest Baby Yet Born.

Essex, Conn., March 5th the smallest baby yet reported was born in Killingsworth, a village about eight miles west of this place, to-day. The parents are Swedes. The father is employed by a farmer cutting timber, and weighs about 190 pounds. The mother is a stout, healthy woman, weighing perhaps 160 pounds. The child is a male, as perfectly formed as a babe can be, and on its birth, weighed only eight ounces.

Its face is about the size of a horse chestnut. The ring worn on the little finger of its mother was slipped over his foot nearly to the knee. It is the opinion of the attending physician that the child will live. It is so small that three of its like could play hide and seek in a cigar box.
