This county was the banner sugar beet county last season, receiving the highest award for tonnage—averaging 21 tons to the acre. Mr. Ferrar thinks Webster county and in fact the entire Republican Valley all most perfect for beet culture.—Grand Island Independent.

This week the gentlemen repeated the dose with a grand reception, and from what we can learn, it was a very elaborate affair. Several from this city who were privileged to attend, pronounce the reception superb, and the hospitality of the Guide Rock people unsurpassed.

Moonshine and Cream.

Bro. Hosmer of THE CHIEF takes exception to our remarks of a couple of weeks ago on the subject of the Red Cloud creamery. He says our talk about there not being cream enough tributary to Red Cloud to keep the creamery going "sounds like moonshine." (May be it does, as we never heard moonshine we are not competent to judge.) To substantiate his assertion that there is plenty of cream in the vicinity, he cites the fact that J. H. Smith once upon a time ran a creamery there for Shraeder & McShane of Omaha that flourished like a green bay tree. In view of the fact that any legitimate business that proves a success, financially, is usually continued; we would like to ask, what has become of that creamery and who has retired to enjoy the fortune accumulated in its operation? It is greatly to be feared that investigation would prove our brother's remark to be another case of "moonshine." Again our brother blows hot and cold with the same breath when he says that he understands that it would be an easy matter to secure the milk of 500 cows and adds, of course, it would take an effort, perhaps to get them. Our remarks were intended as a defense of Messrs Parker & Fulton, who ran the creamery during the summer, of 1892 to the best of their ability and had but little, if anything, left to pay them for their labor. THE CHIEF says they have determined to run it again this summer and the Leader hopes they may find plenty of cream, even if they are compelled to go outside of the country naturally tributary to Red Cloud to get it.—Blue Hill Leader.

Bro. Greenlee is still laboring under a "horrible nightmare" in regard to the creamery business in this city. If he would stop and refresh his mind, he would remember that adjacent to Webster county, on the south there is Smith and Jewell counties, Kansas, besides the north half of Webster, together with the east half and west half and all of the south part of the county, which lies tributary to Red Cloud, and on each quarter section thereof (or nearly so) there are from two to a dozen cows, the cream of which could in nine cases out of ten, be secured for a creamery. Of course the Red Cloud creamery could not expect to get all of the cream, but by diligent effort could secure at least the cream of 1000 cows. McShane and Shraeder sold their creamery to a man by the name of Plumb who did not understand the creamery business, and finally failed, and the property was sold to pay the debts of the concern. McShane and Shraeder made money out of the creamery, and when they sold it they had 1000 cows on their list, and it was one of the best institutions that Red Cloud ever had. Bro. Greenlee says his remarks were intended as a defense of Parker & Fulton. They do not necessarily need any defense. The first year they ran the factory there was a shortage in the cream crop owing to a dry season, and every fair minded person will grant them that point, but last year the creamery was leased to a Blue Hill party, who made a pretense of churning here, but the principal portion of the cream was shipped to Blue Hill to be churned, that is what our people are kicking on. If Ed. McBride of Blue Hill could make money out of a creamery situated at Blue Hill, where there is not near as many cows as there is in this vicinity, why can't the same thing be done here where the bovine flourishes in greater numbers and the lactea production is considerably paramount to that which is to be obtained in our neighboring city? Hence there is no substantial argument to our brother's literary effort that is compatible with the facts in the case that would porticularly fit the Red Cloud situation.

Superintendent John G. Mallieu of the Kearney Industrial school was in Grand Island yesterday, and contracted with the Oxnard Beet Sugar Company for 50 acres of beets, the same to be delivered at the factory. The work will be done largely by the boy attendants of the school and we know of nothing more conducive to good behavior for an unruly youngster than the cultivation of sugar beets. One acre of beets, well cared for, will keep a half a dozen youngsters out of mischief for six months at least, besides teaching them something of usefulness and self-support. Mr. Mallieu will find that the actage will prove profitable in more ways than one, and there are other state institutions that might profit by similar methods. The work is such that man or child can accomplish it with no unnecessary physical ability, and there are inmates of many of these institutions that would prefer to have their time thus occupied.—Grand Island Independent.
